# Welcome to Uxbridge FC

Good afternoon, today we welcome the players, officials, and supporters of South Park (Reigate) FC for this Isthmian League South Central division match. We also welcome our officials, Referee Matthew Rolling and assistants Rikki Woolford & Daniel Merrall

Having finished ninth for three seasons running South Park (Reigate) have struggled this season and have spent most of the campaign in the lower reaches of the table. They are the lowest scorers in the division, finding the net just thirty-two times in thirty-one games. They currently find themselves sitting in 18<sup>th</sup> place, just outside the relegation zone, with former Chipstead boss Rob Kember the man at the helm, charged with preserving their Step Four status. After back-to-back victories against Ashford Town (Middlesex) and Hanworth Villa, The Sparks were beaten 2-0 at home by Southall last Saturday. Last time we met was back in November at Whitehall Lane where we returned with a 2-0 victory, thanks to two goals from George Moore

For us, it was an excellent February seeing us winning three matches and drawing one – with just one goal conceded. Last time out at Honeycroft we cruised past Met Police FC 4-0 with two goals from Ada Okorogheye with Andrio Brandao & Josh Addae also netting. We then travelled to Ascot United last Saturday, in what was a rather cagey affair, a game of few chances ending goalless -but nevertheless a good point away at a fellow play-off side is not to be sniffed at. Match reports from both games are in today's programme.

Our midweek match at Leatherhead last week fell foul of the wet weather and has now been rearranged for Tuesday 25 March KO 7.45pm. After today though we have three away games in a row to contend with, firstly we travel to Farnham to take on the league leaders next Saturday - and will be hoping for a better result than the 5-0 defeat we suffered at their hands in November. It's then a short midweek hop to face Hayes & Yeading on Tuesday 11 March before we make the trip down the A3 to Horndean on Saturday – the club are running a supporters coach to this match, leaving Honeycroft at 12 Noon and returning at 6.30pm for a cost of £20. # Match Report

Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> February  
Uxbridge 4-0 Met Police FC

## Ada at the Double

Two goals and a man of the match performance from Ada Okorogheye saw Uxbridge pick up their third win on the bounce and help to maintain a place in the play off positions, with a comfortable 4-0 win over Met Police on Saturday afternoon.

The game couldn't have started any better for the home side, as from the first real attack of any note on 2 minutes a low cross was blocked but fell to Okorogheye on the edge of the box, and he expertly curled a finish into the far corner, leaving Beach in the visitors goal with no chance. Met Police were on their own unbeaten run of four games, and the early goal spurred them on to recover their composure. They should have been level on 6 minutes when a looping deflected shot appeared to be heading in, however the onrushing striker touched the ball before it went in - and was rightly adjudged to be offside. A real let off for sure, and the game then turned quite scrappy with neither side able to exert themselves on the match. In fact, the next action of any note saw Uxbridge double their lead on 27 minutes, as a pinpoint cross from Massimo Giamattei saw Andrio Brandao ghost in between the defenders and head home. Met Police mustered a few long-range shots as we headed towards the break, but the defence well marshalled by CJ Fearn never looked in any real danger. The home side could have had a third late on, as a ball dropped kindly for Harry Rush on the edge of the box, and he connected with a fine volley that was met by a superb full length stop from Beach, to keep the gap down to two at the break.

## HT 2-0

It could have been three early in the second half, when Daniel Fosu put good pressure on the defence and the ball worked loose, but nobody in a red shirt was able to get a touch and the ball was cleared. Fosu again at the heart of the action a few minutes later, when he was played through, but he lifted his shot over the bar as the defenders closed him down. On 57 minutes though Uxbridge did get a third, as a cross from the right saw Okorogheye out muscle his marker and guide a header back across goal for his twelfth goal of the season. One worrying moment saw CJ Fearn pick up a knock, and was soon replaced on 63 minutes- hopefully just a precaution with the huge match away to Ascot Utd to come next week. Substitute Josh Addae soon came on and made an impact, first of all feeding Jonathon Hippolyte with a great near post cross, that the striker was just unable to make a decent connection with. However, on 74 minutes Addae found space in the box and his low cross-shot somehow evaded Beach at the near post - surprising the keeper and those behind the goal - for Uxbridge's fourth. The Reds nearly had a fifth late on, as an excellent header from Kai Hobbs, was tipped over the bar at full stretch from Beach, partially atoning for his earlier error.

Overall, a solid performance and another three points as we move into the business end of the season, which the Reds will move onto with plenty of confidence

# Match Report

## Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> February Ascot United 0-0 Uxbridge

### Reds Stay the Course

A match played in weather more akin to late April, then late February saw Uxbridge & Ascot play out a 0-0 draw which the visitors would have taken at 3pm, although with the home side down to ten men for the final 10 minutes, there was a chance for this to have been more - but a third clean sheet in a row is a good foundation to start a tricky run of games.

The game itself was a surprisingly low-key affair given it was 3rd v 4th, and the opening exchanges saw neither team able to exert themselves. Ascot did finally create a chance on ten minutes though, when Khalid Simmo drilled the ball across the face of goal but the ball skewed wide for a throw-in. A couple of minutes later the visitors gave the ball away at the back, letting Simmo in, but he was only able to guide the ball straight into the arms of George Legg. Uxbridge came more into the game as an attacking force, with the front three of Dernel Wynter, Ada Okorogheye and Daniel Fosu always looking to stretch the defence, although it was from a corner that brought the best chance on the half hour, as James Taylor rose well with the keeper - but the header went narrowly wide. The next corner also caused some nervousness in the Ascot defence as the ball and keeper were bundled into the net, but to nobody's surprise a foul was given. On 31 minutes Fosu did really well to out muscle the defender in the box, but his volley went agonisingly wide as Uxbridge began to exert some control on the game. Andrio Brandao also went close with a curling shot that went high and wide. As the half drew to a close Ascot could have easily taken the lead when a low Harvey Harry cross was put inches past his own near post by CJ Fearn.

### HT 0-0

The second half followed a similar plan to the first, with both sides cancelling each other out, in fact it wasn't until the hour mark that the first action of note arrived when Harry cut inside and unleashed a fine effort that Legg was more than equal to, Legg was called into action a couple of minutes later making another fine full-length stop from a long-range effort. Massimo Giamattei was having an excellent game at the back for Uxbridge and it was from his cross on 65 minutes that saw Wynter fire a shot just over, for the Reds first real chance of note in the half. The visitors bought on substitute Morrison Hashii for his debut, and the lively forward almost had an immediate impact as he closed down the keeper and blocked the clearance, the ball flew goalwards but fellow substitute Jonathan Hippolyte was unable to get a touch and the ball went just wide. On 80 minutes Ascot defender Joe Gater received a straight red for retaliation after a challenge with Harry Rush, and Uxbridge maybe sensed an opportunity to win the game. However Ascot are a well organised team and they shut the game down, with neither side able to fashion any chances of note - apart from with almost the last kick of the match Uxbridge switched off at the back and gave the ball away on the edge of the box, however Ascot were unable to capitalise, and the ball was cleared to safety and to give both sides a point and probably the right result.

The tough away games continue for Uxbridge now, with a trip to Leatherhead on Tuesday evening, never the happiest of hunting grounds for the Reds, but one they can look forward to being unbeaten in four games

TWO rounds from gracing the hallowed turf at Wembley Stadium, it's perfectly natural to assume that players from the 16 clubs competing in this weekend's Isuzu FA Trophy and Vase quarter-finals are getting pretty twitchy right now. So, as a football manager, the question is how do you channel those nerves, excitement, and perhaps a tinge of anxiety, into a winning mentality? Is it possible to keep emotions in check and feet on the ground?

Well, as Hartpury University manager Dr Martin Longworth told me this week, the answer is with great difficulty. Dr Longworth's entire Hartpury squad are made up of current students aged between 16 and 25 with dreams of a lasting football careers, and they're making a pretty good fist of it so far, sitting pretty on top of the Hellenic League Premier Division table on the back of a 27-game unbeaten run stretching back to September.

"It's really hard to keep a 16-18-year-old's feet on the ground when you're two rounds from Wembley and we haven't shied away from that," Dr Longwell said. "We've made it very clear that that could happen, there's no point hiding from it – it's good motivation for us. "Yes, you've got to take each game as it comes but, ultimately, we are potentially two rounds from Wembley."

Hartpury's two-game mission starts this afternoon when Southern Counties East League side Erith & Belvedere are the visitors to the Hartpury University Stadium they share with the Rugby Championship club of the same name. Many people's favourites for the Vase, Dr Longwell's men have won all four of their matches 1-0 to get to this stage, could history repeat itself all the way to the semi-finals this afternoon. In the other three quarter-final ties, Southern Counties East League play-off chasers Whitstable Town take on Whitchurch Alport, of the Midland Football League, while bookies' favourites AFC Whyteleafe, of the Combined Counties Premier South, take on United Counties League Premier North opponents Bourne Town.

Re-instated Andover New Street, reprieved by Roman Glass St George fielding an ineligible player, complete the line-up with the Wessex League side hosting United Counties League side Heanor Town, making the last eight for the first time in their history.

The Isuzu FA Trophy is just as intriguing. Story of the season, undoubtedly, are Step 4 Isthmian League Division One South East club Sittingbourne FC. Not only are the Brickies the last non-National League club standing, but they have also won through eight ties, scoring 18 goals along the way. During that run, Ryan Maxwell's side have beaten SIX teams on higher standing, including away at National League Southend United in the last round. According to our friends at @FATrophyFactfile, their run to the last eight in the club's 50th FA Trophy campaign, is a competition record. This lunchtime, Sittingbourne host National League Aldershot Town for whom a victory would equal their best Trophy performances to the semi-finals, last achieved 17 years ago.























Since the original Aldershot FC were formed 99 years ago, the club has never reached a Wembley final. Elsewhere, the Shots' local rivals, and three times former Trophy winners, Woking, travel to National League North opponents Oxford City who are equalling their best Trophy run from four years ago. The Hoops will be looking to make it third time lucky against Woking in the FA Trophy having twice exited the competition at the hands of The Cards in the past.

The only other National League North club still involved are looking to prevent their opponents from avenging a past Trophy defeat. Spennymoor Town travel to National League side and 1980-81 Trophy finalists, Sutton United, hoping to replicate their 3-0 victory over the Us from six years ago. And in the only all-National League affair, Rochdale, in just their second Trophy campaign, host an Altrincham side aiming to try to lift the Trophy for the third time in the club's history. One thing's for sure, they'll be 16 squads of players going hell for leather this afternoon in a bid to get one step closer to Finals Day on Sunday May 11.

As the great Ossie Ardiles sung during Tottenham Hotspur's FA Cup song back in 1981, 'Ossie's Going To Wembley, His Knees Have Gone All Trembly'.

If the Vase and Trophy hopefuls aren't nervous and excited enough this weekend, they'll be plenty of trembling knees on the terraces, that's for sure.

**Jonathan Hippolyte (Forward)**

Experienced striker who has played at Step Three of the pyramid for a number of clubs. Began his career at Maidenhead United and has also represented Chesham United, Staines Town, Leatherhead, Chertsey Town, Met. Police and Beaconsfield Town. Joined The Reds in January.

# Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

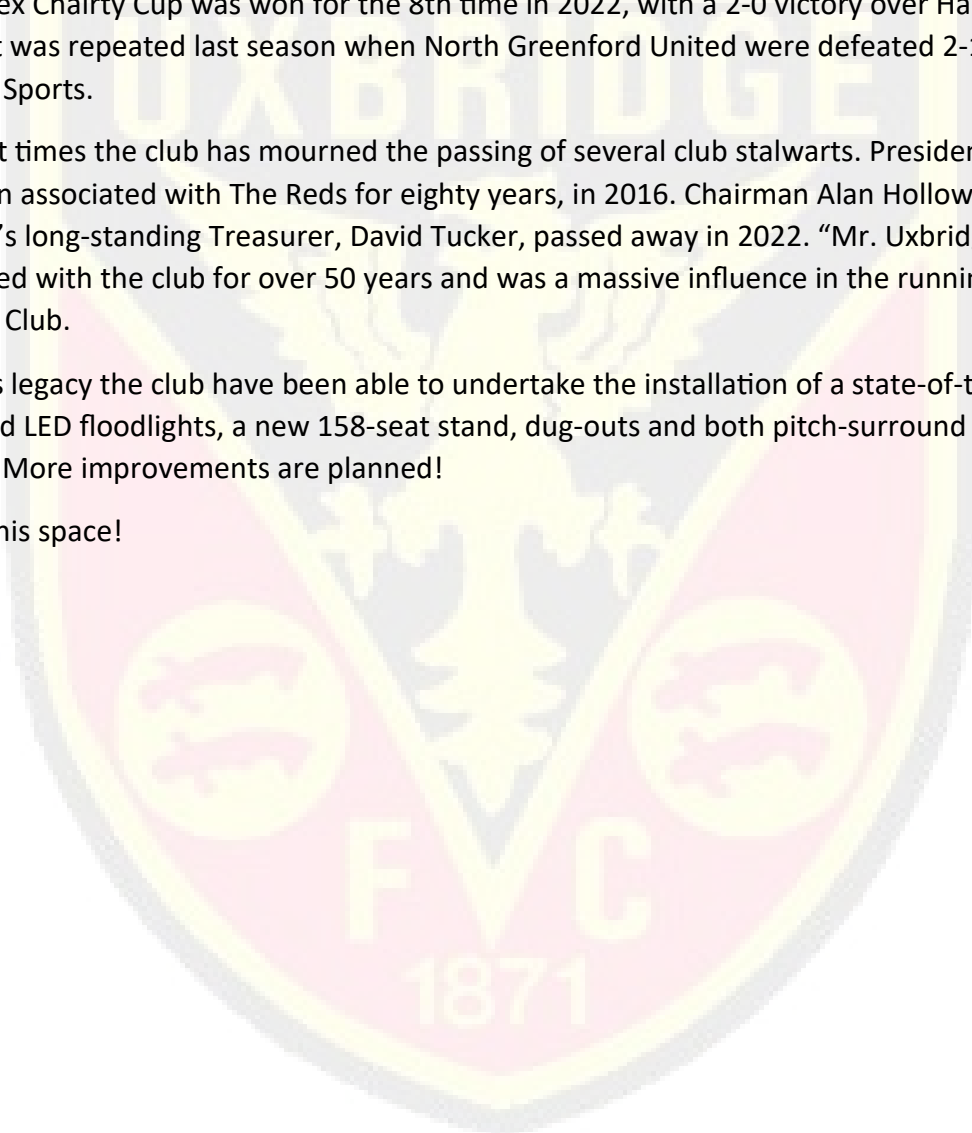
They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Charty Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

## South Park (Reigate) Football Club – A Brief History

South Park Football Club was formed in 1897 and immediately became founder members of the Redhill & District Football League along with other local clubs Godstone, Meadvale and Reigate Priory Reserves. The club remain members of the league today.

Although the facilities were basic the early matches were played in the original sports field which was in upper South Park between Crescent Road and Church Road. In 1925 under the direction of Canon Gregory from the local church, the football club together with the village cricket club formed the South Park Sports Association with the aim of the Association to provide sport and sporting facilities for the people of South Park. Within a few years it was realised that this new concept would be better served by an improvement in facilities and playing conditions. Fortunately for both club's suitable land existed in Whitehall Lane, the clubs current home and with the co-operation of the public spirited landowner, Harold Swannack, four acres of ground were purchased there. Always strapped for cash in these early years, the money was raised for the field largely by public subscription, which included door to door collections.

In order to preserve the land as a permanent sports ground, great foresight was exercised in vesting the land and subsequent purchases of further lots of two acres and four acres making ten acres in all in the National Playing Fields Association, now known as Fields in trust. The land became known as the 'King Georges Field' from 1935. The changing rooms were located on the far side of the field from Whitehall Lane at the bottom of the number two football pitch. Although the facilities were an improvement on their previous home they remained basic.

The football club flourished in the years leading to the Second Great War but obviously declined during and immediately after it. A handful of stewards rallied to the cause however and quickly resurrected its fortunes. One legacy of the hostilities, the air raid shelter, became the focus of attention when it became clear that further improvements were needed to the facilities if sporting aspirations were to be advanced. Thus it was that a shower room and toilet block and a modest clubhouse were attached to this building. Funding for this was achieved through the tireless efforts of the 'Friends of South Park Sports Association' organisation. Despite these commendable efforts, the Association lived for many years on a hand to mouth basis with the management all too frequently having to put their hands into their own pockets to ensure its survival.

During this period the playing side of the football club flourished with numerous honours won in the local leagues and cups together with appearances in County Cup finals. The club were also honoured in the fact that a number of players progressed to senior football with clubs such as Redhill and Eastbourne Town in the fifties and sixties, the heyday of non league football.

The seventies and eighties brought further improvements to the changing facilities and clubroom and the purchase of the land that is now our main pitch were made. In the early seventies the football club started the junior's section. Over the years the number of teams has increased on a regular basis and today we have boy's teams from under eight's through to under sixteen's.

In 1997 the football club celebrated its Centenary year, the highlight of which was a celebratory dinner held at Reigate Manor Hotel at which over 150 people attended. Many players both past and present attended along with guests from The Football Association and Surrey County Football Association. The club was presented with its own unique framed certificate from the Football Association to mark this occasion.

The club was once again celebrating in 1998 when Geof Thatcher was awarded a Gold Medal by the Football Association to commemorate over 50 years service to football, the whole period with our club dating back to the war years when the club only played friendly matches as there was no competitive football during the war.

2001 saw Reigate Town Football Club move to South Park and the club became known as South Park & Reigate Town Football Club. In 2002 the club saw the formation of the first girl's team to play under the club's name and we now have four girl's teams. The following year saw the introduction of the youth team who are currently playing in the Southern Youth Floodlight League. The youth team played their home matches at Merstham Football Club from 2003–2007 as at the time we did not have floodlights.

For the 2003/04 season the club reverted back to its original name of South Park Football Club. In February 2004 the club became only the fifth in Surrey to be awarded the status of 'FA Charter Standard Community Club'. In 2006 the first team were promoted to the Combined Counties Football League and as our new changing facilities were being built played their home matches at Cranleigh. In their first season in the Combined Counties League the team finished in seventh place in the league. 2007 saw the completion of our new changing rooms and the erection of floodlights around our main pitch. This ensured that our first and youth teams could now play their home matches in South Park.

The 2008/09 season saw another landmark in the history of the club when we hosted Shoreham in our first ever FA Vase game. The 2009/10 season saw the club finish in their highest position (6th) since joining the Combined Counties League. The club has continued to progress and in August 2010 our stand will be erected which will give us the ground grading required for the first team to gain promotion. The 2010/11 season will see the club participate in the FA Cup for the first time with an away tie against Greenwich Borough in the extra preliminary round. This game was covered by ITV Sport to start their Road to Wembley coverage as were our subsequent ties against Horsham YMCA and Cray Wanderers. The first team won the Surrey Premier Cup Final and the Lemon Recordings Division One Challenge Cup in addition to being promoted to the Premier Division of the Cherry Red Records Combined Counties League.

The 2011/12 saw South Park finish in eighth position in their first season in the Combined Counties League Premier Division. A good run in the FA Carlsberg Vase saw us reach the Fourth Round where we were beaten by Whitley Bay, the Vase winners for the previous three seasons. Playing in the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time Park beat Ryman Premier League Kingstonian and Leatherhead before finally being knocked out in the quarter finals by Conference South Sutton Utd. Season 2012/13 saw the club reach the 4th Qualifying Round of the FA Cup with Budweiser where we played Metropolitan Police in front of a club record attendance of 643. The team finished the season in 4th place in the league and reached the league cup final.

The 2013/14 season saw South Park win the Combined Counties League Premier Division and in doing so gain promotion to the Isthmian League Division One South. Our first season at step four saw us finish in a creditable 14th position. Each season has seen us improve on the previous season's league position with an 8th place finish in 2016/17. The 2016/17 season also saw us reach the 2nd Round of the FA Trophy where we drew away to Tranmere Rovers. South Park finished the 2017/18 season in 13th place in the league. They also reached the semi finals of the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time. Malcolm Porter announced that he would be stepping down as manager due to business commitments at the end of the 2017/18 season.

Mick Sullivan was appointed as manager however after a poor start to the season the club accepted his resignation in mid October. Jay Lovett was appointed manager and took charge of his first game at the beginning of November. Park went into the final game of the season needing to match Molesey's result to retain their step 4 status. Park gained a 3-2 victory to secure their Step 4 status.

The Sparks made a solid start to the 2019/20 season however manager Jay Lovett resigned at the beginning of November to take up a similar position at Burgess Hill. Martin Dynan was appointed as Manager in mid November. He guided Park to the ¼ finals of the Surrey Senior Cup and maintained their mid table position before the season was abruptly halted due to the Covid 19 pandemic. The 2020/21 season curtailed after 8 games due the pandemic. The 2021/22 season saw Park sitting in mid table in late January when Martin Dynan resigned. The club acted swiftly and appointed Redhill Manager Harrison Williams. Harrison and his management team settled in quickly and Park finished in 9th place in the league. Ahead of the 2022/23 season the club name was amended to South Park (Reigate) FC. Harrison Williams resigned at the end of November 2022. Assistant Manager Tom Cope was appointed manager and the side matched the previous years finish of 9th place in the league with a higher points total.

The 2023/24 season saw Park finish in 9th place in the league for the third successive season however notable firsts were achieved two Cup competitions. In the FA Trophy we reached the 3rd Round for the first time narrowly losing 1-0 away to National League North Hereford. Our run to the 3rd round include victories against step 3 sides Hashtag Utd and Bognor Regis Town. To round off the season we won the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time in our history defeating Farnham Town 1-0 in the final

It must also be noted that without the tireless efforts of the late Fred Dearmun, Geof Thatcher, Ray Wilson and Geof Arnold to name but a few, the club would not be in the position it is today.
