Welcome to Uxbridge FC

Good afternoon, today we welcome the players, officials, and supporters of Leatherhead FC for this Isthmian League South Central division match. We also welcome our officials, Referee Pablo Aguilar Cabanes & Assistants Craig Griffiths & Jack Healy.

Only eleven days has passed since we travelled to Fetcham Grove to meet the Tanners. How time flies! Undoubtedly, they will be out for revenge after our 1-0 win, and with games fast running out, they need all three points to keep their play-off ambitions alive. Leatherhead's season has been one of two halves, they had a slow start -only winning 1 of their opening seven matches, and at one stage languishing down in 20th place. However, they have been on an upward curve since then, and in fact travel to Honeycroft today 3rd in the current form table, from the last ten games, one place above us -although both sides have identical records. Won seven, drawn one and lost two - so, a close encounter is predicted again today. Last week Leatherhead were involved in a local derby against Kingstonian, and in an eventful encounter, which saw the Ks equalise in the 93rd minute before The Tanners secured all three points with a winner in the 96th minute. The final score 3-2.

Our own superb recent form has seen us climb to second in the table and the dream of a play-off place is agonisingly within touching distance. Two weeks ago, we suffered a home defeat to a very confident looking Rayners Lane side, despite the late pressure from us the visitors were well worth their 4-2 win. However, we bounced back well, with the 1-0 win at Fetcham Grove being followed by a superb 4-1 win at Raynes Park Vale last Saturday. In what looked like a tricky test on paper, early goals from George Moore & Kai Hobbs settled the nerves, and despite the home side pulling a goal back, Dernel Wynter's strike right before half time saw us lead 3-1 at the break. The second half saw us dominate, and we could have added more goals than Andrio Brandao's effort to show for it. Match reports from all recent games can be found in today's programme

Next up we welcome Sutton Common Rovers here next Saturday, before yet another testing awayday when we travel to Hanworth Villa on Saturday 19th April. There is a short turnaround as Southall will be the visitors here on Easter Monday, before our last scheduled fixture is a trip to Westfield on Saturday 26th April – we of course hope to extend our season by at least one more game into the end of season Play Offs. I'm sure Danny and all the team will be delighted to have your support at as many of the remaining games as possible, as we look to make this a season to remember.

Match Report

Saturday 22nd March
Uxbridge 2-4 Rayners Lane

Uxbridge Rayned In

With a number of key matches to come in the race for the playoffs, things didn't go to plan as Rayners Lane took all three points on Saturday, in a game where the Reds only came to life after the game was already lost. Lane came into the game in fine form, having won the Middlesex Senior Cup at Honeycroft only 3 days earlier by beating Hanwell Town, so Uxbridge would have known they were in for a tough match from the kick-off.

Uxbridge arguably saw the greater of the early possession but with just a couple of wayward shots the only things of note. Rayners Lane though took the lead with their first chance of note on 7 minutes after hesitation and a lost ball in midfield saw Frank Keita find space on the left-hand side of the penalty area, and he rifled a fine shot past Legg into the far corner for his 24th league goal of the campaign. The home side could have done with a similar cutting edge as they struggled to make any inroads to the visitors defence. Their best chance of the half came on 35 minutes when good interplay saw Josh Addae break into the box on the right-hand side, but he was unable to keep his shot down and the ball went high and wide. The chance spurred on Uxbridge though and three minutes later, the ball fell to Andrio Brandao on the edge of the box, who hit a good shot, destined for the top corner but Endurance Johnson in the visitor's goal pushed the ball away at full stretch to maintain the lead. The importance of the save was shown minutes later as the ball was again lost on the midfield, and Deshane Dalling was played in to shoot low past Legg to double the advantage. Right on the half-time whistle though Uxbridge got a lifeline as a Casey Bocarro corner was headed back across goal by Kai Hobbs into the path of Darnell Wynter who made no mistake heading past Johnson, meaning it was game on in the second half.

Any thoughts the goal would spur on Uxbridge were decimated within a six-minute spell, despite the first chance of the half falling to Harry Rush who pulled a low shot inches past the post on 46 minutes. Rayners Lane grabbed a third when the well-travelled Marvin Sordell latched onto a loose pass and he coolly slotted home, despite Legg getting a hand to the ball. It got worse for the home side three minutes later though as a deep cross was superbly volleyed home by Elliott Buchanan to leave the reds really staring down the barrel. It wasn't until just past the hour mark that Uxbridge started to make some inroads as substitute Ada Okorogheye came on to try and claw things back, his header from an Addae cross on 66 minutes forced Johnson into action. A second goal did arrive on 71 minutes - as a Rayners Lane player was down in the box, Uxbridge played on, and a ball to the back post was headed in by Kai Hobbs - leaving twenty minutes to try and salvage something from the game. With a number of the visitors team going down for injuries now, first Harry Rush had a shot blocked from a few yards out, the ball fell to Brandao whose shot went over. Uxbridge kept pushing though, and on 77 minutes Dan Fosu did superbly to out muscle a defender in the box, only for some desperate defending to deny him a clear shot. An unseemly incident on 85 minutes saw Massimo Giamattei leave the field after a clash of head and a forward's elbow, with the referee deeming there no incident to deal with. Ultimately Uxbridge had plenty of possession late on, and made a good shout of trying to get back in the game, but it wasn't to be, and Rayners Lane held on to take the victory.

A bad day at the office at a bad time for the Reds, who now make an awkward looking trip to Leatherhead on Tuesday evening - themselves closing in on a play off place - Uxbridge will need to dig deep to maintain their own hopes.

Reds Bounce Back

After the disappointment of the home defeat by Rayners Lane on Saturday, some Uxbridge fans may have been concerned by this tricky looking trip to in-form play off chasing Leatherhead on Tuesday evening. The Reds though came away with a fine battling win, one of real heart and passion, throw in a penalty save and a red card, and all in all this was an excellent three points.

The game started in cagey fashion, with Leatherhead seeing plenty of the ball, but it was the visitors who fashioned the first chance on 7 minutes as the ever-willing George Moore cut in from the left but curled his shot over. Soon after, Harry Rush latched onto a Moore pass on the edge of the box, but his shot too was wayward. Leatherhead's best opening came on the quarter hour, when some good work on the wing, saw Matthew Everitt beat a couple of defenders, and his fine cross was intercepted by CJ Fearn at the near post and cleared for a corner – with the home sides attackers closing in behind it was a crucial intervention. The game then settled into a low-key affair with Uxbridge happy to sit back and hit Leatherhead on the break.

This paid dividends in the 32nd minute when a ball into Massimo Giamattei outside the box, saw him turn and get a shot on target, this caught out Sonny Wheeler in the Leatherhead goal who initially must have thought it was going wide – however the ball had other ideas, and with Wheeler scrambling to get over, it went into the corner of the net. The game settled back into a similar pattern, with very little of note for the remainder of the half – that was until right on the whistle Uxbridge should have doubled their lead. Moore again at the heart of things did superbly to get in the box and get to the byline, his pull back was inch perfect to an unmarked Andrio Brandao, his low shot was on target but Wheeler somehow got to the ball with his legs – and although Moore wasn't able to tap in from an offside position – the home side would have been delighted to only end the half 1 down.

HT 1-0

The second half was more of the same, with Leatherhead having plenty of possession, but the main threat was from set pieces with first a corner being headed narrowly wide, and then a free kick being whipped across the face of goal with nobody able to get a touch. Just after the hour mark, Uxbridge got another good chance when Ada Okorogheye used his strength to outmuscle the tanners defence, his low shot was well saved at full stretch by wheeler, would Uxbridge regret the missed chances? Things were made significantly more difficult on 70 minutes, when a ball over the top saw Kai Hobbs bring down his man, and referee Mr Bolland – not shy of administering cards all evening – brandished a second yellow for Hobbs, leaving the Reds to hang on for the best part of 20 minutes with ten men. It looked as though this wouldn't happen as on 75 minutes Leatherhead earned a penalty when former red Anuar Ceesay was brought down in the box. Kane Fitzgerald stepped up, but Legg pulled off a fine save to preserve the lead. From then on with Uxbridge sitting back, Leatherhead enjoyed plenty of the ball, but the visitors defence held firm superbly marshalled by CJ Fearn, Legg was called into action on surprisingly few occasions – dealing with anything thrown at him comfortably. There was one late chance for the Reds as Okorogheye broke and fed Moore, but his shot was well blocked. There were then plenty of stoppages for substitutions and injuries which broke up the play – on a couple of occasions tensions boiled over between the players as Leatherhead desperately tried to find a way through, but it wasn't to be, and the Reds were delighted with an excellent victory and move onto another real test away at Raynes Park Vale on Saturday.

Match Report

Saturday 29th March

Raynes Park Vale 1-4 Uxbridge

After the tough test at Leatherhead on Tuesday, the fixture list had thrown up another tricky looking match away at Raynes Park Vale on Saturday. The hosts went into the game unbeaten in three and having defeated Kingstonian 3-0 in midweek - so a tough test awaited the Reds for sure.

However Uxbridge took control of the match from the off, and in fact took the lead with their first attack on five minutes. Kai Hobbs played in a fine pass to George Moore, who took the ball into the box and coolly slotted past the keeper. Things got even better for the visitors five minutes later as Ada Okorogheye did well on the left hand side of the box to get his cross to the onrushing Hobbs to emphatically head home from six yards out - sending the travelling fans into disbelief at being two up so early. The home side were unable to get any traction into the game, with Uxbridge controlling the play, in fact it could have been three on 28 minutes as Moore once again broke clear but this time steered his shot just past the far post. Raynes Park did finally get going on the half hour when Jermaine Green volleyed just wide. Darnell Wynter then had another good chance for Uxbridge but shot straight at the keeper. It looked like the Reds would rue the misses as on 39 minutes a lucky ricochet fell to Trevan Robinson who expertly curled a shot inside the far post to halve the deficit - could Uxbridge see out the half? - in fact they increased their lead right on the whistle as Wynter again found himself one on one with the keeper - from a good lofted pass by Okorogheye - and this time he finished well to give Uxbridge the two goal advantage at the break

The late goal seemed to knock any belief out of Raynes Park, as they struggled to break through the Reds rearguard, with Uxbridge expertly managing the game. In fact The Reds should have increased their lead on 49 minutes but Moore was unable to keep the ball down when he was well placed. Slowly the home side did create some chances, firstly they hit the post from a deflected shot and then on the hour Tyler Cox headed narrowly wide. Any thoughts of a comeback were snuffed out on 71 minutes though, as good strength from Okorogheye, saw him hold off his man and then find Andrio Brandao who cut inside two defenders on the edge of the box and shot low past the keeper to make it four. The home sides heads then dropped, and Uxbridge created plenty more chances. Firstly Fearn volleyed over from a corner, as he lost his footing. On 80 minutes Okorogheye broke into the box and was unfortunate to see his shot cannon back off the crossbar with the keeper beaten, soon after Moore had another chance to increase his tally as he rounded the keeper, but was forced too wide and could only find the side netting. With the game won, Raynes Park did force Legg into a fine save with a shot from distance, before they hit the outside of the post again from a free kick.

Ultimately Uxbridge were good value for the win, and the fact they will be disappointed not to have scored more speak volumes about where this team is now. Results elsewhere mean The Reds now sit second and with more pivotal games to come in the weeks ahead they are well placed for securing a play off place - next up is a quick return meeting with Leatherhead at Honeycroft next Saturday.

AMIDST the serious stuff confined behind the closed doors of a football club boardroom, a level of humility is so important.

Football is a different animal these days – especially at elite level – with the Beautiful Game now almost a subsidiary to a ruthless, cut-throat business enterprise.

But non-League football, where the game is at its purest, still proudly holds its traditional values and there's one day a year in particular where that humility comes to the fore: April Fool's Day. Fueled largely these days by their social media presence, football clubs simply can't resist playing a light-hearted seasonal prank on their supporter base and, let's face it, it gets us every time!

Take Ebbsfleet United's Liam Daish being pictured holding aloft a Usain Bolt shirt with his 100m record 9.58 emblazoned on the back after the club announced they had clinched the signing of the Jamaican sprinter. Or, how about when the United Counties League announced they were to trial VAR – a reveal so convincing that it even fooled some FA chiefs into questioning the move around the boardroom table.

This week, of course, the tricksters were out in force again – and your Non-League clubs didn't disappoint. Many pranks involved aspects of stadia with Tiverton Town revealing their intention to paint their pitch in the club's yellow and black colours in a spirited attempt to rally the team for the final stretch of the season.

Farnborough FC announced that their pitch was to double up as a heliport, as an extension of Farnborough Airport, while neighbours Aldershot Town revealed, Del Boy style, that they had discovered a natural spring at their EBB Stadium and would be offering Aldershot Natural Spring Water in the near future. Water cheek! Crowborough Athletic went a step further by announcing plans to move into a 'world-class' all-seater stadium dubbed "Wembley of the Weald", while Radstock Town also unveiled plans to build a brand-new stadium on the site of an old Co-Op supermarket.

Ashington continued the theme by announcing the club were being forced to move into the grounds of the nearby Ashington Hirst Castle by the Coal Authority after a small hole was found in one of the penalty areas, caused by a collapsed seam from the former Woodhorn Colliery. Several clubs revealed they had signed former star players – with two, ironically, snapping up the same one! Former Fulham, Wigan and Ipswich midfielder Jimmy Bullard was introduced by both SC Thamesmead and Boston Town, while ex-Tottenham favourite and TV pundit Garth Crooks was unveiled by Leighton Town.























Elsewhere, Chorley FC announced the exclusive launch of their club collectables, including a figurine of manager Andy Preece, while Tamworth confirmed that their Lamb Ground will host competitive lamb racing on a matchday as part of their half-time entertainment. That's baa-ry believable!

And in a bold step for international relations, Dover Athletic revealed how they will play their next home game across the Channel in Calais with fans invited to attend the match aboard the new club ferry. Bishops Cleeve unveiled a new slick oil colour shirt (which actually looked quite nice) in conjunction with a sponsorship deal with petrochemical giants INEOS, while Welsh club Colwyn Bay announced that, as from next season, the club will be known as the Turtles rather than the Seagulls, as part of our new partnership with The Blue Turtle Group, with the team running out to the song 'Turtle Power'.

So, once again for April Fool's Day, our Non-League clubs have done us proud while reminding us that amidst all our airs and graces as football fans, there is always room for a lighter side.

To quote the legendary Jimmy Greaves: "It's a funny old game".

Troy Murray (Defender)

Young left-sided defender who made his Uxbridge debut in April 2024. Represented Reading at Youth level before joining Binfield.

Massimo Giamattei (Defender/Midfield)

"Mas" was a regular member of the Chertsey Town side that won the Isthmian League South Central Division title last season. Former professional at Swindon Town who has also played for Bracknell Town and Basingstoke Town.

Harry Gallagher (Defender)

Joined the Honeycroft family in January from Welwyn Garden City. His goal for Northwood against the Reds, in February 2023, was voted goal of the season. Previously represented Broadfields United before joining Northwood.

James Taylor (Defender)

Signed on a dual-registration agreement from Chesham United in September 2024. Former Captain of Hayes & Yeading United's Under 18 Academy side. Strong commanding central defender whose previous clubs include Egham Town, Bedfont Sports, Harrow Borough and Beaconsfield Town.

CJ Fearn (Defender)

Joined the Reds from Farnborough on a dual registration in September. Commanding defender who has over ten years' experience at Steps 2 & 3 of the football pyramid.

Luke Paris (Defender)

Luke is a Full International and has represented his country, Anguilla, in World Cup Qualifiers. In his third season at Honeycroft and recently passed the 50 appearances mark.

Casey Bocarro (Defender/Midfield)

Versatile player who is comfortable at full-back or midfield. Signed this summer from Virginia Water where he scored important goals from midfield.

Kai Hobbs (Defender)

Kai joined Uxbridge on a permanent deal this summer after impressing on loan from Basingstoke Town last term. Classy right full back who looks to have a bright future in the game.

Joshua Addae (Defender)

Former Crystal Palace youngster who signed for the Eagles from Langley FC. Fleet footed full-back who likes to get forward. Made his Reds debut at Kingstonian in August 2024.

Alex Witham (Midfield)

Former Arsenal youngster who played alongside Jack Wilshire for the Gunners. Talented player who is in his fourth season at Honeycroft. Former player of the year who has made over 100 appearances for the Reds.

Leo Decabo (Midfield)

Leo joined The Reds in September 2024 from Hartley Wintney and made an instant impact with two goals on his debut against Phoenix Sports in the FA Trophy. Scored an impressive 22 goals for Burnham last season.

George Moore (Midfield / Forward)

Attacking midfielder who joined us from Harrow Borough in 2023. Last season's top scorer, which saw him voted the Supporters Player of the year. Was regularly amongst the goals at Step three.

Andrio Brandao (Midfield)

Skilful, attacking midfielder who joined from Virginia Water last season. Made a big impression during the latter part of the campaign and everyone at the club is excited to watch his progress this season.

Harry Rush (Midfield)

Harry was Captain of Hanwell Town during their promotion winning season in 2021/22, scoring 13 goals from midfield. Made his debut against Harrow Borough on New Years Day, after joining from Chesham United.

Wilson Chingoka (Midfielder)

All action midfielder who joined the club in January 2024. Big personality who has experience at Step 3. Previous clubs include Nuneaton Borough, Potters Bar Town, Lewes, Bedford Town, Staines Town and Northwood.

Leo Donnellan (Midfielder)

Former Queens Park Rangers youngster who has played for Finn Harps in the League of Ireland, and Portadown in Northern Ireland. Joined The Reds in October 2024 from Hanwell Town. Previous clubs include Harrow Borough, Dagenham & Redbridge, Enfield Town and Maidstone United.

Fabio Sole (Midfield/Forward)

Young attacking midfielder signed from Hendon in November 2024. Played for Hanwell Town in season 2023-24. Started his career with Reading U-18s, moving on to Oxford United U-18s from whom he went on loan to Farnborough. On leaving Oxford United he took a career break, then joined Slough Town and Met. Police before joining Hanwell in July 2023, and then onto Hendon in July 2024

Robert Bunn (Midfield)

A bright prospect who has impressed in the Youth Team this season. Only just turned 17 Robert has gained valuable first-team experience during this campaign.

Ada Okorogheye (Forward)

Came through the Academy at Slough Town before moving to the United States to study and play "soccer". Played last season at step 3 with Beaconsfield Town. Scored a hat-trick on his Uxbridge debut at Cobham in the FA Cup.

Daniel Fosu (Forward)

January signing from Binfield. Dan was Thatcham Town's top scorer in 2021/22 and moved to Scottish Championship side Arbroath the following season. Also played for Peterhead north of the border before moving back South to Hanwell Town.

Jonathan Hippolyte (Forward)

Experienced striker who has played at Step Three of the pyramid for a number of clubs. Began his career at Maidenhead United and has also represented Chesham United, Staines Town, Leatherhead, Chertsey Town, Met. Police and Beaconsfield Town. Joined The Reds in January.

Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deducted six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Charty Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

Leatherhead – Club History

LEATHERHEAD FOOTBALL CLUB can trace its history back to the formation of Leatherhead Rose in 1907. Rose were crowned Champions of the Dorking & District League in 1910 and 1919 before joining the Kingston and District League where they won the League title three times, the last in 1938-39. Leatherhead United were formed in 1924 and, in 1925-6, won Division One of the Sutton and District League. In the early 1930s, United joined the Surrey Junior League becoming Champions in 1933-4.

After the War, officials of the two clubs met and in May 1946, Leatherhead Football Club was officially formed at a public meeting. United's Fetcham Grove ground was to be used as the home ground. The Tanners went on to win four consecutive Surrey Senior League Championships before spells in the Metropolitan, Delphian and Corinthian Leagues. Tanners were Corinthian League champions in 1963 before moving into the Athenian League. Leatherhead won promotion from Division One at the end of the first season and inaugurated their floodlights with a match against a Fulham side. Leatherhead won the Surrey Senior Cup for the first, and to date, only time in 1969.

After being elected into the Isthmian League, Leatherhead made national headlines in 1974-5 when they reached the Fourth-Round proper of the FA Cup, defeating League sides Colchester Utd and Brighton & Hove Albion before bowing out to First Division Leicester City 2-3. In subsequent seasons, the Tanners defeated two more Football League sides at the Grove – Cambridge United and Northampton Town.

After the disappointment of defeat in FA Amateur Cup semi-finals in 1971 and 1974, the Tanners finally reached Wembley Stadium in 1978 but were beaten in the FA Trophy Final. The Club then entered a period of decline and were relegated in 1983 and in 1990, slipped down into Division Two South but were back in Division One in 1997. Finances were a problem and in the summer of 2000 the club was within a few days of folding but was saved by its supporters who took over following a crisis meeting.

In 2006-7, Leatherhead were the lowest ranked team to reach the First Round Proper of the FA Cup, losing 1-2 at Football League side, Torquay United. Mick Sullivan was appointed First Team Manager in May 2009. Under Sullivan's guidance, the club had its most successful season in years, winning the Isthmian League Cup (the first major trophy for some 40 years) and finishing the season in fifth place in the League before losing a play-off semi-final. The following season, a dramatic play-off victory against Dulwich Hamlet (4-3 after extra time), saw The Tanners return to the Premier Division for the first time since 1983. Tanners stay lasted just the one season though. In 2013-14 Tanners reached the play offs again, this time edging out Guernsey 3-2, before winning a penalty shootout at Folkestone Invicta to return to the Ryman Premier Division.

Sammy Moore was appointed in the summer of 2017. In his first managerial job Sammy steered Tanners to the second round of the FA Cup, a County Cup Final and a top eight finish in the League before departing for Concord Rangers along with the majority of the team. He was replaced by former Margate boss Nikki Bull who, despite having to rebuild the squad, took the team to an 8th place finish narrowly missing out on the play-offs.

After a poor start to the 2021-22 season Luke Tuffs was appointed manager in January 2022. but was unable to steer the club out of the relegation places, although from a seemingly impossible position it was very close.

After an indifferent start to 2022-23 Hayden Bird was appointed to the Fetcham Grove hot seat in October. He led Tanners to the play-off final in 2024, but Marlow prevailed in the final. At the start of the current season Ian Selley was appointed as manager.



Here is a quick introduction to the Tanners management team and the players at Fetcham Grove

Manager - IAN SELLEY – Ian had a successful playing career the highlights being his time at Arsenal where he won the European Cup Winners Cup, F A Cup and League Cup. He went on to play for Fulham and Wimbledon amongst others He worked as head coach at the Arsenal academy in Dubai for 7 years before starting his non-league career at Chertsey Town. In his time their Town finished 2nd in the league and lost in the play-off final to Hanwell town. He moved to Fetcham Grove in May 2024 from Westfield. Field reached the play offs last season before losing narrowly to eventual winners Marlow.

Assistant Manager – MICK BENNETT – Mick has over 30-years-experience as a coach and was previously Ian's assistant manager at Chertsey Town and Westfield and is also Academy Coach at Brentford.

Coach – ADAM PITTWOOD - Adam is a former professional footballer who enjoyed spells at Millwall, Crystal Palace, Nottingham Forest and Fulham whilst also being involved in the England youth set-up, Adam has now transferred his knowledge to the touchline achieving UEFA coaching status Previously 1st team coach at South Park and Westfield.

The Players

KAREEM AKINNIBI – Young striker who impressed scoring 21 goals in total last season for Badshot Lea and Met Police, before signing for Marlow. Previously played for Tooting & Mitcham, Sutton Common Rovers, Redhill and Chessington & Hook Utd.

CERNY ANDO – French defender signed from South Park in November 2024. Cerny, 20, started his footballing career in the youth system at AFC Wimbledon before moving to another League Two side Salford City in November 2020. He moved back down south and has featured for Kingstonian, Met Police, Aveley, Cray Wanderers, Bedfont Sports, Merstham and Egham Town.

RUBEN BARTLETT-ANTWI – Young striker signed from Basildon United in November 2024. Prior to Basildon he was with FC Romania and Stansted.

KENNY BEANEY – Experienced midfielder signed from Kingstonian in December 2022. He has also played and enjoyed success at Merstham, Dulwich Hamlet, Wealdstone, Beckenham, Grays Athletic and Thurrock. Currently sidelined through injury.

CAMERON BLACK – Originally played for Tanners in the 2022-23 season, on loan from Dorking Wanderers, when he was voted Supporters Player of the Year. The commanding centre back has subsequently played for Hampton & Richmond, Hayes & Yeading, Bognor Regis, Cray Wanderers and Raynes Park Vale from where he re-joined the Tanners in February 2025.

NIRAN BUTLER – The 24-year-old defender came through the academy at Barnet and has played for the likes of Staines Town, Sutton Common Rovers, Kingstonian, Maldon & Tiptree and more recently Westfield before joining the Tanners in May 2024.

TY BUTLER – Attacking midfielder who joined his brother at the Tanners in January 2025. Previous clubs include Sutton Common Rovers and Corinthian Casuals.

DEONDRE DATE – Exciting young striker originally signed on a dual registration deal from National League South side Tonbridge Angels before signing permanently for Tanners in December 2024. He spent last season at South Park finding the back of the net fifteen times in all competitions. He was previously a youth player at Sutton United and also played for Bagshot.

TYLER D'CRUZ – Recent signing from Binfield where he was a regular goal scorer. Joined the Moles from Reading City in 2023.

MATT EVERITT – Young forward who is a former Ireland U19 International. He spent three years with Brighton & Hove Albion playing for the Seagulls from U18s to u23s. Signed for Dorking Wanderers in August 2023 and spent part of last season at Carshalton Athletic. Joined the Tanners in August 2024. Currently out through injury.

KANE FITZGERALD - Creative midfielder who joined in July 2024 from league rivals Badshot Lea. He was Baggies club captain and scored 24 goals in 118 appearances. He also won the Player's Player, Manager's Player and Supporter's Player of the Season awards in 2021/22. He has previously played for Ashford Town, Knaphill, Bracknell Town, Binfield and Farnham Town.

LUKAS FRANZEN-JONES – Striker signed in October 2024 after a short spell with Margate. He played for Newhaven, Burgess Hill, East Preston, Pagham, Three Bridges and Haywards Heath before joining Lancing ahead of the 2023-24 season where he was on top form playing 43 times in all competitions and scoring 28 goals. LFK will add firepower to the Tanners squad.

MARCO HAIGH – Summer 2024 signing from league rivals South Park. Young forward who has also appeared for Kingstonian, Sheerwater and Farnborough.

GEORGE HEDLEY – Defender signed from Badshot Lea in July 2024. He made 54 appearances last season, scoring ten goals and was the Baggies Players and Supporters Player of the Year for the second year running. George was a product of Aldershot Town's Academy and has also played for Westfield.

ALFIE HUCKLE - The young midfielder started his career at Chertsey and more recently Westfield. Last season's player's player of the season for Westfield with a good passing range and bags of energy. Signed in May 2024.

ALEX LAING - Much travelled goal-scoring left winger who numbers Burgess Hill, Shoreham, Whitehawk, Horsham, Lancing, Lewes, Littlehampton Town, South Park, Worthing and Haywards Heath Town among his former clubs.

KELVIN-MANUEL MASSANGO – Left sided defender who can also play further forward. Joined in the summer of 2024 after spending the previous couple of seasons with South Park. Has also appeared for Redhill.

ADAM MORLEY - a full back/winger joined in February 2025. Adam was part of the Academy at Boreham Wood, although has played for the first team in the County Cup. He has had a loan spell at Leverstock Green this season, and prior to his time in Boreham Wood played Academy football for both Barnet and Leyton Orient.

RHYS MURRELL-WILLIAMSON - An electric winger, Rhys includes Lewes, Kingstonian, Cray Wanderers, Uxbridge, Hendon & Hayes among his former clubs alongside Hampton & Richmond, St Albans City & Borehamwood. Rhys started his career in the Crystal Palace Academy before a short spell with Celtic and then Sutton United.

ALEX PEARCE – signed in October 2024 the experienced defender brings a wealth of experience to the Tanners. Alex has previously played for Reading, Bournemouth, Derby, Millwall and AFC Wimbledon.

SONNY WHEELER – Goalkeeper who signed for Bracknell Town in 2019, moving from Wealdstone and had previously been in the youth set ups at Reading and Watford. Played for Flackwell Heath and Sandhurst before signing for Westfield last season. Followed Ian Selley to Fetcham Grove in May 2024.
