Welcome to Uxbridge FC

Good afternoon, today we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Southall FC for this Isthmian League South Central division match. We also welcome our officials, Referee Manny Chandwani & Assistants Bimi Sherifi & Daniel Harvey. We trust that you will enjoy your stay, and we wish you all a safe journey home afterwards.

The penultimate game of the season, where have the last eight months gone! As they say, “time flies when you’re having fun” and we have certainly had some fun this season, whatever transpires over the next five days. What a difference a year makes. This time last season Southall were battling for a play-off place, while we were languishing down the league in twelfth position. Southall Manager Max Howell made sixty-seven appearances for The Reds between 2009 and 2014 and has been in charge at Southall for over 300 games, guiding them to a narrow play-off semi-final defeat at Leatherhead last season. (2-3 on penalties). The current form table shows our visitors in thirteenth place with seven points - three points and five places below The Reds.

For us following the amazing win over Leatherhead, we were brought down to Earth with a bump as Sutton Common Rovers came here to Honeycroft and left with a 1-0 win, thanks to a very late goal. We then headed over to Hanworth Villa on Saturday, and there is not enough space to cover everything that occurred, but the important thing is George Legg didn’t suffer any serious injury, following a collision with Pierre Fonkeu in the first half. The whole team deserve tremendous credit for the way they responded to, what at the time were distressing scenes, and were close to earning all three points. A special mention to Harry Gallagher who took over in goal and made some great saves and was only beaten from the spot. Sam Merson’s ninety-eighth minute penalty, his twenty-fifth league goal of the season, meant the game ended all square. A full match report can be found in today’s programme. Southall were also involved in a high-scoring draw (3-3) at home against Rayners Lane. All six goals coming in the opening fifty minutes.

After today the final scheduled league game will be away at Westfield next Saturday, if you are able to get down to Surrey to cheer on the boys, please do so – it would be greatly appreciated. Of course, we hope that this won’t be the last match of the season – but it’s all up in the air for any of the play off places – the dates of any potential play offs are below – but we won’t tempt fate by talking about them too much – let’s just focus on picking up the three points today.

Whatever happens we thank you for your support over the course of this season, enjoy the match and see you on the other side.

Match Report

Saturday 12th April

Uxbridge 0-1 Sutton Common Rovers

Time to get out the good old football cliches for this match. "A weeks a long time in football" "It's a funny old game" and "there's no easy games in this league" are a good start, but I'm not sure any really can explain how Uxbridge can go from beating a fellow play-off contender 10-0 one week, to losing to a relegation candidate 1-0 just seven days later. To be fair on the day Sutton Common Rovers probably deserved the three points, after an Uxbridge side without talismanic forward George Moore due to illness, failed to spark and The Reds are left with three games to secure a play off place.

It was a match that really failed to get going at all, although on 4 minutes Andrio Brandao laid the ball off to Harry Rush who saw his shot deflected over from the edge of the box. The game then drifted and apart from efforts from Brandao and Dan Fosu, straight at the keeper - the first 15 minutes were of little consequence. Rovers were happy to absorb any pressure and try to counter on the break, which they did comfortably. On 26 minutes Uxbridge fashioned a good chance as a corner was not cleared, and the ball back into the box was headed narrowly over by James Taylor. As the half drew to a close Uxbridge had tier two best chances of the day, firstly on 37 minutes Brandao did superbly to get into the box on the left hand side, he laid the ball back across the box to an onrushing Dernel Wynter, but he was only able to pull his shot wide of the post on the run. Three minutes later though The Reds should have been ahead, Ada Okorogheye being his usual industrious self, did superbly to hold off a defender and get into the box, as he twisted and turned he was brought down, and a penalty was the correct result. Josh Addae stepped up and put the ball to the left of Kacper Orłowski, who guessed correctly and pushed the ball away to keep things level. Within 2 minutes Rovers broke away and had top scorer Daniel Pepple had more composure, he would have scored, but he fired over when well placed.

The second half was more of the same, in fact checking my notes nothing of any consequence happened until just after the hour mark - which sums up the match perfectly. It was Wynter who put some pressure on the Rovers defence as they tried to shepherd the ball out, he won the ball but Orłowski saved the cross-shot well, and no player in red was able to get to the loose ball quick enough. The rest of the half saw plenty of speculative efforts from both sides, but neither defence was unduly troubled. But it was the visitors who grew more in confidence as the half wore on. Two free headers that went wide from corners on 79 and 81 in quick succession, should have been the warning for Uxbridge that Rovers were not happy with a point, but it was not heeded as on 83 minutes the ball was lost in midfield, allowing a breakaway but the Rovers attack were unable to take advantage and the resultant shot went narrowly wide. After another shot went into the side netting, Sutton Common finally did get their goal on 89 minutes, as some sloppy play in midfield saw the ball get loose and Christian Adugyamfi played in non the left hand side, to be one on one with George Legg, he calmly slotted the ball past him to send the Rovers team and staff into wild celebrations. There was time for one last Uxbridge chance as a free kick on the edge of the Rovers box was drilled across the face of goal by Massimo Giamattei, bit nobody in red could get a touch and the visitors held on for a famous victory.

The despondency around the ground was tempered slightly as a lot of other results went Uxbridge's way, meaning they still ended the day in 2nd, and a place in the playoffs remains in their own hands. Next up though a trip to 3rd place Hanworth Villa on Saturday, where a more positive result than this will be needed. Time to get out another football cliché and take each match as it comes.

Match Report

Saturday 19th April Hanworth Villa 2-2 Uxbridge

Before I start the match report - we should all remember that football is just a game and everyone's health is more important than 90 minutes.

As we know Easter Saturday saw Uxbridge hop over to the other side of Heathrow Airport to take on Hanworth Villa, with both sides looking to resurrect their challenge for second place and home advantage in the playoffs after Uxbridge surprising defeat last time out to second bottom Sutton Common Rovers and Hanworth Villa having picked up a solitary point from their last two games. Both teams had their top goal scorer's return with the Hosts Sam Merson and Uxbridge George Moore.

Uxbridge made two changes to their starting lineup with left back Casey Bocarro returning from injury replacing Andrio Brandao who dropped to the bench and Moore replacing Dernel Wynter. An attacking bench was selected with Morrison Hashi replacing Luke Paris on the bench, could that come back to haunt us? The game taking place in windy conditions and a very bobbly pitch saw Uxbridge play percentage football with nothing to report in the opening exchanges bar an offside on 7 minutes when Okorogheye fed Moore, but the assistant referee raised his flag for offside. Hanworth didn't heed to the combination and two minutes later, Okorogheye picked the ball up on the halfway beat the bobbles to feed Moore who cut inside and curled a shot on his right foot which hit the post and it fell invitingly to Massimo Giamatti to smash home.

In the 17th minute Hanworth Villa dragged a shot wide, and still not much to note when 23 minutes elapsed when Hanworth got the first corner of the game. In the 27th minute, Hanworth were level, from a throw in their own half -which was taken ten yards from where it should have- was flicked on to Sam Merson and a fantastic finish went in off the post. Both teams scoring with their first shot on target!

2 minutes later and the game became insignificant, Uxbridge keeper George Legg ran to the edge of the area to claim a high ball against a Hanworth forward who jumped with Legg and Legg's momentum took him over the forward and landed badly causing a nasty looking injury to his head / neck area. An ambulance was subsequently called which caused a 45-minute delay to proceedings. We as a club are thankful for the Hanworth Villa physios and staff as a whole for helping George Legg following the collision and the supporters for showing empathy for Legg. Thankfully I am pleased to say it wasn't as bad as it looked and he is out of hospital. Harry Gallagher came on and went in goal which saw Hanworth shooting from distance hoping for a keeper error, this never came.

40 minutes elapsed and Ben Mulley of Hanworth picked up the first yellow of the game for disputing a referees call, their frustrations starting to show as maybe they expected to be winning by half time! On the stroke of half time Gallagher allegedly tipped the ball over the bar much to everyone's amusement/bemusement!

At 16:58 with every other team finishing their game, our second half started. Villa hoping that a centre half in goal would be an accident waiting to happen but 4 minutes in a long throw by Villa was met by a 'photographer' save by Gallagher - he's done this before! Uxbridge first corner came in the 51st minute which was won through Moore endeavour. An in swinging corner was met by Kai Hobbs who had walked round 2 defenders, behind the keeper and found himself unmarked to nod home, not for the first time this season! Two shots on target and 2 goals for the Red (Blue today) Army!

Villa made their first sub on 54 minutes as Lucas Defise replaced Louis Collins. They made their second on 61 minutes with Shane Dunne replacing Ben Mulley. With the game not producing any shots Uxbridge had a chance in the 72nd minute but Rush just failed to feed Okorogheye and the defender cut out a one on one.

Uxbridge made their second change in the 75th minute with Sole for Fosu. 79 minutes passed when an Uxbridge long throw was met by the head of CJ Fearn but his flicked header was saved by the Villa keeper. A minute later Okorogheye ran through and shot from a tight angle which was parried in the middle of the goal but evaded our players to a Villa defender to clear! Villa, sensing their luck was in didn't expect Gallagher to be much cop in goal but a cross came in the box from our previous play and he plucked it out of the air 1 handed!

James Taylor collected a yellow card for kicking the ball away in the 82nd minute, despite him not knowing the ball was off the pitch! Villa were getting desperate and made their final sub with 5 minutes of normal time remaining - Manny Parry replacing Pierre Fonkeu - which put their centre half who was at least 6foot 5 up top, unfortunately Uxbridge Luke Paris wasn't on the bench to counteract the height difference! This change nearly worked a treat when another ball pumped into the box was partially cleared and the resulting shot was parried by Gallagher but the impressive and influential C.J Fearn was there to clear.

With a minute to go of normal time, Wynter replaced Okorogheye who again and as always put in a superb shift. 7 minutes injury time was flagged, where that came from only the ref knows! Most expected 5!

Uxbridge didn't sit back and Bocarro skipped past the Villa right back and had a 2 vs 2 but was taken out on the follow through, cynically yes, but I believe the phrase is 'taking one for the team'! With the red/blue faithful biting their nails, Moore raced clear in the 95th minute and dragged his shot wide. Should he have gone for the corner or taken a touch to get nearer the goal, you can't blame him as he's been fantastic all season and in this match.

97 minutes passed which the referee indicated was the minimum, last chance saloon for Villa which saw a free kick from the half way line pumped into the box for a final time, we won the first header and Fearn looked to clear it but the attacker got there just ahead, and instead of the ball going into row Z, Fearn kicked the attacker, cast iron penalty which Merson tucked away. The final whistle went 10 seconds after the restart!

In summing up, it was a fantastic result bearing in mind their friend, was taken to hospital and to get their 'heads on' was incredible.

Uxbridge next game is on Easter Monday when we take on Southall at Honeycroft, kick off is at 3pm. We look forward to seeing as many of you there as we will look to confirm our playoff spot with a win. Whatever, the outcome we should be second going into the last game of the season but a win would all but guarantee a runner spot in the league for this fantastic group of players.

CROWN dependencies offshore football clubs have become part and parcel of the Non-League Pyramid in recent years with Guernsey, Jersey Bulls and FC Isle of Man all valued members of our National League System.

But I wondered what the arrangements entail for opposition teams flying across to play on these islands, so I joined the official Southall party heading to Guernsey for their Isthmian South Central; fixture last Sunday to find out more.

The build-up saw Guernsey sending travel details to their opponents. In effect, the host club covers the cost of return flights for a group of up to 25 people from Southall plus coach transport to and from Guernsey Airport. This forms part of Guernsey's agreement to compete in mainland competitions. Here is my diary of how the mammoth matchday experience unfolded...

7.00am – Meet up deadline at Gatwick Airport South Terminal. The Southall players arrive on time smartly dressed in club tracksuit tops.

7.15am – Southall's enthusiastic chairman Sanjeev Sharma does a final headcount to make sure everyone is present. He grins: "I'm feel like I am the players' dad looking after them all!"

8.00am – We are through security and on to the plane. I am sitting next to Southall manager Max Howell. He admirably video calls his young children prior to take-off.

8.35am – The Aurigny Airline flight to Guernsey departs on schedule. It's a one-hour journey spanning 160 miles. Also on board are the three match officials for this afternoon's game. Not surprisingly, they respectfully keep their distance.

8.50am – There is escalating merriment amongst the Southall squad because midfielder Chris Mulindwa has fallen asleep with his mouth wide open. So, his crafty teammates rest a coffee stirrer on his lower lip. I take a photo to capture the moment for posterity.

9.00am – Max explains his deep-thinking managerial philosophy to me. "My players are chess pieces that I move around the pitch," he says, reflecting on his nine years at Southall as a player, then coach and now manager.

9.35am – We touch down in Guernsey and the local coach appears outside the tiny airport. Our driver is a dead ringer for TV personality Bill Oddie. Much to my amazement, he negotiates the narrow island roads by frequently mounting pavements to pass oncoming cars. This time, I am sat alongside chairman Sanjeev. He describes his burning desire to find his beloved club a permanent stadium in Southall. It will end 33 years of nomadic groundsharing following the loss of their spiritual home at Western Road. They are currently based out of the area at Burnham but will switch to Hayes & Yeading next season.

10.00am – We stop off at a very nice hotel where Southall booked pre-match breakfast. It is good to see the players choosing healthy options from the buffet spread although some of us older guys readily tuck into fried eggs and black pudding!

12noon – The coach is ready to take us to the game.

12.30pm – We pull up at Guernsey's newly unveiled £10 million Victoria Park Stadium which is staging only its second fixture. The Southall party are warmly greeted by Guernsey directors John Loveless and Nic Legg.

12.35pm – I take a peek at the facilities consisting of two excellent grandstands on either side (offering 700 seats combined) and covered terracing behind both goals. I am thoroughly impressed by the 3,000 capacity venue. It is easily up to National League South grading criteria. The Guernsey Football Association offices are here too.

1.00pm – Several of the Southall players don't have football boots compatible with requirements specified by Victoria Park's artificial pitch manufacturer. However, Guernsey are able to loan replacement boots.

1.10pm – I approach Southall director Stephen Harrison for an in-depth chat. His family possess a long association with the club and Stephen outlines how he decided to become a co-owner. In addition, I spot a couple of loyal Southall supporters visiting Guernsey for the weekend.

2.00pm – Kick-off in our Isthmian League South Central Division encounter. Guernsey have the wind behind them and dominate pulsating first half exchanges without scoring. Into the second period, Southall muster a great 20 minutes peppering the home goalmouth. All of a sudden, Guernsey break away and Sam Murray decisively shoots into the net. Two minutes later, Southall are reduced to ten men (Ryan Hope red card) thereby affecting their chances of gaining a positive result.

3.50pm – Final score...Guernsey 1 Southall 0, attendance 891. A vital three points for the 'Green Lions' in battling against relegation.

4.20pm – Guernsey serve a delicious sit-down meal of Thai green curry to the Southall party in a reserved section of the plush clubhouse. Yet the West London players are visibly disappointed by the match outcome and eat in near silence.























5pm – The coach returns to take us to the airport ahead of our 6.10pm flight.

7.10pm – After the Southall contingent waited patiently in Departures throughout an unexpected one-hour delay, we embark on our plane back to London. I'm seated again beside manager Max who is considerably deflated by this defeat. He gives me a fascinating blow by blow analysis of the match I've just watched. I tell him that he can take plenty of positives from his team's performance.

8.15pm: We land at Gatwick Airport to conclude our lengthy day out. There are handshakes all around as the exhausted Southall party go their separate ways freshly anticipating local derbies versus Rayners Lane and Uxbridge over Easter.

Needless to say, I was pretty cream crackered when I eventually arrived home, but the trip will go down as one of my most memorable ever.

Young left-sided defender who made his Uxbridge debut in April 2024. Represented Reading at Youth level before joining Binfield.

Massimo Giamattei (Defender/Midfield)

"Mas" was a regular member of the Chertsey Town side that won the Isthmian League South Central Division title last season. Former professional at Swindon Town who has also played for Bracknell Town and Basingstoke Town.

Harry Gallagher (Defender)

Joined the Honeycroft family in January from Welwyn Garden City. His goal for Northwood against the Reds, in February 2023, was voted goal of the season. Previously represented Broadfields United before joining Northwood.

James Taylor (Defender)

Signed on a dual-registration agreement from Chesham United in September 2024. Former Captain of Hayes & Yeading United's Under 18 Academy side. Strong commanding central defender whose previous clubs include Egham Town, Bedfont Sports, Harrow Borough and Beaconsfield Town.

CJ Fearn (Defender)

Joined the Reds from Farnborough on a dual registration in September. Commanding defender who has over ten years' experience at Steps 2 & 3 of the football pyramid.

Luke Paris (Defender)

Luke is a Full International and has represented his country, Anguilla, in World Cup Qualifiers. In his third season at Honeycroft and recently passed the 50 appearances mark.

Casey Bocarro (Defender/Midfield)

Versatile player who is comfortable at full-back or midfield. Signed this summer from Virginia Water where he scored important goals from midfield.

Kai Hobbs (Defender)

Kai joined Uxbridge on a permanent deal this summer after impressing on loan from Basingstoke Town last term. Classy right full back who looks to have a bright future in the game.

Joshua Addae (Defender)

Former Crystal Palace youngster who signed for the Eagles from Langley FC. Fleet footed full-back who likes to get forward. Made his Reds debut at Kingstonian in August 2024.

Alex Witham (Midfield)

Former Arsenal youngster who played alongside Jack Wilshire for the Gunners. Talented player who is in his fourth season at Honeycroft. Former player of the year who has made over 100 appearances for the Reds.

Leo Decabo (Midfield)

Leo joined The Reds in September 2024 from Hartley Wintney and made an instant impact with two goals on his debut against Phoenix Sports in the FA Trophy. Scored an impressive 22 goals for Burnham last season.

George Moore (Midfield / Forward)

Attacking midfielder who joined us from Harrow Borough in 2023. Last season's top scorer, which saw him voted the Supporters Player of the year. Was regularly amongst the goals at Step three.

Andrio Brandao (Midfield)

Skilful, attacking midfielder who joined from Virginia Water last season. Made a big impression during the latter part of the campaign and everyone at the club is excited to watch his progress this season.

Harry Rush (Midfield)

Harry was Captain of Hanwell Town during their promotion winning season in 2021/22, scoring 13 goals from midfield. Made his debut against Harrow Borough on New Years Day, after joining from Chesham United.

Wilson Chingoka (Midfielder)

All action midfielder who joined the club in January 2024. Big personality who has experience at Step 3. Previous clubs include Nuneaton Borough, Potters Bar Town, Lewes, Bedford Town, Staines Town and Northwood.

Leo Donnellan (Midfielder)

Former Queens Park Rangers youngster who has played for Finn Harps in the League of Ireland, and Portadown in Northern Ireland. Joined The Reds in October 2024 from Hanwell Town. Previous clubs include Harrow Borough, Dagenham & Redbridge, Enfield Town and Maidstone United.

Fabio Sole (Midfield/Forward)

Young attacking midfielder signed from Hendon in November 2024. Played for Hanwell Town in season 2023-24. Started his career with Reading U-18s, moving on to Oxford United U-18s from whom he went on loan to Farnborough. On leaving Oxford United he took a career break, then joined Slough Town and Met. Police before joining Hanwell in July 2023, and then onto Hendon in July 2024

Robert Bunn (Midfield)

A bright prospect who has impressed in the Youth Team this season. Only just turned 17 Robert has gained valuable first-team experience during this campaign.

Ada Okorogheye (Forward)

Came through the Academy at Slough Town before moving to the United States to study and play "soccer". Played last season at step 3 with Beaconsfield Town. Scored a hat-trick on his Uxbridge debut at Cobham in the FA Cup.

Daniel Fosu (Forward)

January signing from Binfield. Dan was Thatcham Town's top scorer in 2021/22 and moved to Scottish Championship side Arbroath the following season. Also played for Peterhead north of the border before moving back South to Hanwell Town.

Jonathan Hippolyte (Forward)

Experienced striker who has played at Step Three of the pyramid for a number of clubs. Began his career at Maidenhead United and has also represented Chesham United, Staines Town, Leatherhead, Chertsey Town, Met. Police and Beaconsfield Town. Joined The Reds in January.

Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

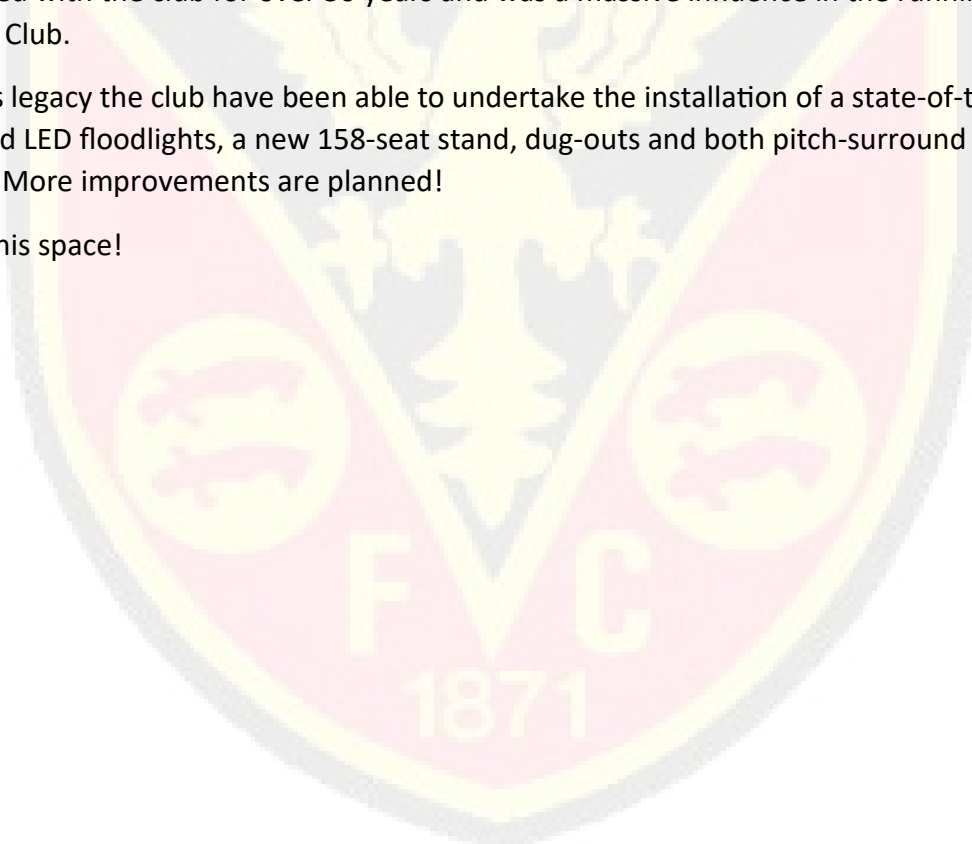
They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Charty Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

Southall FC Club History

Southall Football Club is one of the oldest clubs in the South East of England having been founded in March 1871, their first match being a 1-0 defeat against local neighbours Uxbridge played at Southall Park on October 21st, 1871. Southall quickly established themselves as a major club locally and entered the FA Cup in the 3rd year of the competition. Uxbridge remained their main local rivals during the first few decades since the founding of both clubs in 1871. Southall joined the prestigious Southern League for the 1896-97 season, during which time they regularly played the likes of Brentford, Fulham, Watford, Brighton & Hove Albion and Wycombe Wanderers. Southall used several grounds in the town before finally settling in at their Western Road ground in 1906, after merging with Southall Athletic FC. Western Road remained their home until the early 1990's.

The most successful period for the club was between the 1920's up to the 1960's, when crowds numbering in the thousands regularly attended, especially for games against local rivals such as Hayes, Hounslow and Uxbridge and the club produced several Amateur Internationals and players that went on to join professional clubs during this period. For the big away games and important cup ties away from home coaches and trains were often chartered for the locals to follow the club's exploits.

In 1925 Southall reached the Final of the FA Amateur Cup, when they narrowly lost to Clapton 2-1 at Millwall FC in front of over 25,000 spectators and won the Athenian League title in 1926-27. Another momentous season occurred in 1935-36 when Southall recorded 17 consecutive cup victories in various competitions. During this season they became the first non-league club to start in the FA Cup Extra Preliminary Round and reach the 3rd Round Proper before finally losing to Third Division South professionals Watford in front of Western Road's record gate of 19,094. They also beat Third Division South club Swindon Town at home 3-1 in the FA Cup 1st Round. Their cup exploits that season meant that they had to play 23 matches between 1st April and 2nd May, which included 2 games on the same day twice!

The club were forced to take the decision to sell their ground to the local Council in 1940 due to financial pressures during World War II and became tenants of the Council for the rest of that ground's existence. Southall have also played big Amateur Cup matches at Stamford Bridge, Highbury & Craven Cottage, all in front of over 20,000 fans. The club's last big cup day out was for the 1986 FA Vase Final at Wembley. In the 1970's and 1980's future full England Internationals Gordon Hill, Alan Devonshire, and Les Ferdinand played for Southall in their younger days.

Western Road was the arguably finest non-league ground in the area, regularly being selected to host finals and semi-finals of local and county cup competitions. It had a fine clubhouse, which regularly held many social events and was hired out by local clubs and societies as well as regularly being a venue for local bands to play at. Unfortunately, Ealing Council closed Western Road in the early 1990's and eventually awarded the replacement site to a breakaway club, which folded soon after. Southall FC has been forced to share grounds since this time but are hopeful of finding a suitable site back in the town in the near future.

Having been in the doldrums in terms of league performances since the late 1990's, Southall won the Spartan South Midlands League Division 1 title in 2017-18, their first championship for 91 years. This also earned them their 2nd promotion in the 2010's and secured a spot back on the Combined Counties Premier Division. The league reorganisation for the 2021-22 season saw Southall in the Premier Division North. An exciting season was played out with cup runs in the FA Vase (1/4 final), Middlesex Charity Cup (semi-final) and League Cup (finalists), but more importantly the league runners up spot was secured, which heralded promotion back to the Isthmian League.

With 4 promotions in the last 14 years, steady progress has undoubtedly been made since the club suffered back-to-back demotions at the beginning of the century. Negotiations with Ealing Council appear to finally be heading in the right direction and when a new home back in Southall is finally secured all involved with the club are hopeful that Southall can finally get back up towards the top of the non-league pyramid.
