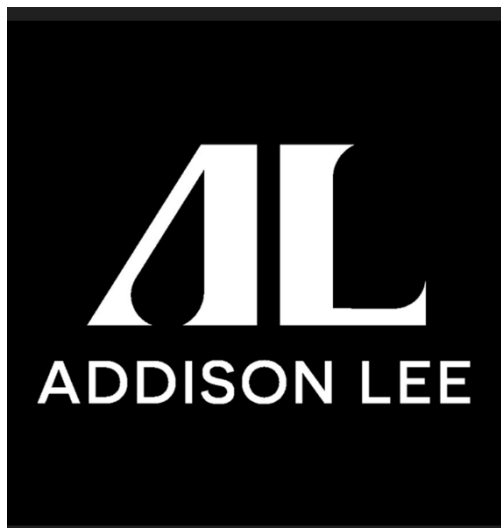
Upon completion of the current redevelopment works at Honeycroft, Langley FC will be playing their home fixtures at Horton Road.

AFTER months of uncertainty, angst and sheer agony at times, the long-suffering supporters of Southend United and Scunthorpe United were finally given some reason to cheer last week.

Two proud, but horribly mistreated, football clubs in the throes of crisis and teetering perilously on the brink of non-existence, while generations of fans lined the streets in a desperate attempt to force the boardroom change necessary to keep their clubs alive.

In Southend United's case, it was about as serious as it could get.

A winding-up petition to the High Court over a £275,000 tax debt threatened to bring an end to the Shrimpers' 116-year history with much maligned owner Ron Martin at the centre of the protests for his refusal to sell up.

But at 4.40pm last Tuesday afternoon, the loyal faithful finally got the news they had waited so long for after a three-man consortium of supporters, led by Australian businessman Justin Rees, announced they had finally got the deal over the line.

"We can confirm that an agreement for the sale of the club has been reached with a consortium led by Justin Rees," a club statement read.

"We recognise that this has been a stressful time for all associated with the club. We would like to thank our staff for their incredible loyalty and also thank all our stakeholders for their patience."

Stressful is one way of putting it. Indeed, as Judge Sebastian Prentis said when concluding at a previously adjourned winding up hearing "if this were not a football club, with the particular attachment to its fans, I would be winding them up today,"

Martin, who took over the club in 1998, has been the target for all the fans' ire for how the situation has spiralled to the brink of abyss.

Protests have been held outside his house, marches through the coastal town before matches and games even held up when toy rats were thrown on the pitch in a desperate bid to get him to sell-up.

Fan power also won the day 230 miles further up the east coast when a bumper crowd of 5,063 attended Scunthorpe United game with Brackley Town last Saturday to celebrate the dawn of a new era for the Iron.

A takeover deal with former commercial director Michelle Harness finally brought an end to David Hilton's turbulent nine-month tenure in charge.

Hilton had replaced Peter Swann in the Glanford Park hotseat in January amid an FA investigation. Last week, he confirmed that he had withdrawn his funding from the club and was actively trying to sell the club.

On Wednesday, however, it was announced that, despite a looming eviction from Glanford Park, winding up petitions, county court judgements and players and staff not being paid, Harness had agreed to take over a 75 per cent share of the club, while fans did their bit by clubbing together to raise more than £68,000 to help pay the staff in their hour of need.

Saturday's game with Brackley Town was emotional for another reason as Scunthorpe's last at their famous Glanford Park home "for the foreseeable future" with a groundshare in place at Gainsborough Trinity 17 miles away.

But Simon Elliott, who was on the cusp of taking over from then-chairman Swann in December 2022 only for the deal to collapse prior to Hilton's arrival, says talks were underway with landowner Swann.

"Negotiations have already started," Elliott said. "The sustainability of Scunthorpe United is dependent on this support that we have seen throughout the past few weeks continuing for many months and years to come, through high times and hopefully not so many low times."

Sadly, not all clubs are as blessed as Southend and Scunthorpe when it comes to powerful fanbases and this week it wasn't such great news for Step 4 Hamworthy United.

The Hammers have been hamstrung since the closure of the only seated stand at their County Ground home, the headquarters the club leases from the Dorset FA, following a structural report in February this year.

An on-off deal to replace it was eventually struck and with a short-term groundshare at Weymouth secured at the 11th hour, United got the green light to remain at Step 4 this season.

However, with demolition work now paused following the discovery of unexpected asbestos, officials felt they had no choice than to quit the Southern League and pull the plug on the first team to safeguard the club's long-term future.

"We didn't want the club to go bankrupt," chairman Steve Mitchener told us with the reserves now taking on first-team responsibilities in the Step 7 Dorset Premier League.

"I have been associated with the club for 51 years and despite our recent success, it is just so disappointing that we won't have the opportunity to continue with a team that I felt was capable of not only playing at this level but achieving more.

"The decision was not taken lightly but we had to do this to preserve the club and the business."

At the end of the day, fan power played a massive part in rescuing Southend and Scunthorpe from oblivion, while Hamworthy weren't quite so fortunate.

As drastic and as sad as it was for Mitchener to pull the plug on the Hammers' season, it's a prime example of responsible club ownership, something that the higher-profile pair would have given anything for.

JOSH ANDREW – DEFENDER

An experienced defender at Step 4, Josh has made the right-back slot his own since making his debut in March 2022.

LUKE PARIS – DEFENDER

A commanding centre-back Luke is in his second season at Honeycroft, having joined from Windsor FC. A full international for Anguilla where he has played in World Cup Qualification.

SHAUN PREDDIE – DEFENDER

Former Harrow Borough Captain who made over 300 appearances for the Earlsmead Club. His experience will be vital at the heart of The Reds defence.

LEWIS PATRICK – DEFENDER

In his second season with Uxbridge having joined in the summer of 2022 from Risborough Rangers. A pacey full back who likes to get forward and support the attack. Young Player of the Year winner 2022/23.

SEAN MCGUINNESS – DEFENDER

Young defender who joined from Chalfont St Peter in February 2023. Tall and elegant player who looks to have a bright future.

RYAN HAUGH – DEFENDER

Equally at home at full back or in the centre of defence. Joined Uxbridge from Harrow Borough in 2019 but missed most of last season through injury.

BRYAN TAYLOR – DEFENDER

Left-sided defender who can deliver telling crosses. Signed for the club this summer from Chertsey Town.

MICHAEL BRYAN – MIDFIELD

Vastly experienced midfielder who was previously with Harrow Borough. Made 14 appearances for Watford in the Championship and earned two full International Caps for Northern Ireland in 2010. Will add guile and skill to the middle of the park.

ALAN HEDLEY – DEFENDER/MIDFIELD

Made his 100th appearance for The Reds last season having joined from Chalfont St Peter in 2019. Mr consistent, he was named Supporters Player of the Year last season.

LEWIS COLE – MIDFIELD

Lewis began his career at Uxbridge, making his first team debut at just 19 years of age in 2014. Left Honeycroft in 2017 to join Harrow Borough. Had brief spells at Chertsey Town and Hanwell Town last season.

ALEX WITHAM – MIDFIELD/FORWARD

Uxbridge's top scorer last season, which saw him pick up the Player of the Year award. Good in the air and with his feet his versatility makes him a managers dream. Former Arsenal Youth, who played alongside Jack Wilshire for the Gunners.

EZRA NDUKUBA – MIDFIELD/FORWARD

Attacking midfielder with quick feet. Has an eye for goal and the Club are delighted to have him back after he missed the whole of last season with a serious injury.

DEAN MORGAN - FORWARD

Came to Honeycroft this season after a long career in the Football League. Previous Clubs include Colchester United, Reading, Luton Town, MK Dons, Leyton Orient, Chesterfield and Wycombe Wanderers. Will be a real asset to The Reds forward line this season.

BRAD PAGLIAROLI – MIDFIELD/FORWARD

New signing this season having been part of the successful Binfield side last term. Wide player who gets his fair share of goals with his direct play. Has also represented Thatcham Town.

GEORGE MOORE - MIDFIELDER

Former North Greenford United and Harrow Borough midfielder who has an eye for goal. Can play in many positions and his versatility will be vital this season.

BERNARD MENSAH – FORWARD

Previous Clubs include Watford, where he was part of their Youth set-up, Aldershot Town, Bristol Rovers, Gloucester City and Redditch United. A talented striker who joined the Club this season.



UXBRIDGE FOOTBALL CLUB - HISTORY

In the late 19th century the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel. Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set-up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC.

The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874 but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year. The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born.

Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final. The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace.

Unfortunately, their North East rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners. During this successful period for the club they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War.

Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name.

An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920. A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3. Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit.

Championship celebrations however were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow. Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War.

During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town. Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr W.S. Try.

The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of Non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963 and club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warm-up for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0.

The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985.

The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South Central Division.

They have won the Middlesex Charity Cup on three more occasions in the last eight years. Defeating Brentford in 2013, Wembley in 2014 and Ashford Town (Middlesex) at Hanwell Town FC in 2019.

In the summer of 2016, the Club lost one of its stalwarts when long serving President Alan Odell passed away. Alan had been associated with The Reds for over 80 years, firstly as a supporter and player in his youth, before serving in various official duties as a committee member. He is sadly missed.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager over the past 51 years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18-years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019.

Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's.

The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. Last season the club had a fantastic run in the FA Trophy, reaching the 3rd Round where they lost to National League side Dagenham & Redbridge

KENNY BEANEY – Experienced midfielder signed from Kingstonian last December. He has also played and enjoyed success at Merstham, Dulwich Hamlet, Wealdstone, Beckenham, Grays Athletic and Thurrock.

OLLIE COOK - Commanding centre-half signed from Carshalton Athletic in the summer. Started out with Fulham youth before joining the Southampton Academy. Counts Merstham and Kingstonian among his former clubs.

TYLER COX – Young skillful winger signed from Sutton Common Rovers in the summer. Has also turned out for Lingfield and Sutton Utd.

ALPHA DIALLO - Young midfield player who came through the youth ranks at Dulwich Hamlet and made his first team debut in 2022. Spent some time on loan at Merstham before signing for Tanners in 2022.

MICHAEL ELECHI - A Manchester United Youth graduate. Michael, joined their Academy in 2016, but was released in 2018. He subsequently joined Oxford United and signed his first professional contract in December 2018, lasting until summer 2022. Had been playing for Salisbury before signing in October 2022.

DAN HECTOR – The speedy forward was an integral part of the Merstham and Kingstonian teams who enjoyed exceptional FA Cup campaigns. Dan is a former Leatherhead player, having appeared for a short spell under Nicky Bull. More recently, he has played for Carshalton Athletic and Sevenoaks Town.

OMARR LAWSON - Midfield player signed in December 2022. Previous clubs include Canvey Island, Bognor Regis, Dulwich Hamlet, Lewes, Crawley Down, Whitehawk, Sevenoaks, Ashford Utd & Kingstonian.

BRADLEY MANNING – Young full back who spent part of last season on loan from Aldershot. Signed permanently for the Tanners in the summer.

TREY MASIKINI - Attacking midfield player signed in the summer from Merstham. Has also played for Carshalton Athletic and Corinthian Casuals.

TOBY McKIMM - Young goalkeeper who came through the ranks at Tonbridge Angels. Impressed when called upon last season.

BRIAN OKONKWO – Young Arsenal academy goalkeeper who has joined Tanners on a three-month loan deal. Has previous senior experience at Hitchin Town.

LUKE PHAIR – Young midfield player who came through the youth and Academy ranks at Aldershot Town and Woking. Currently on loan at Fleet Town.

JERRY PUEMO – Centre back signed in December 2022 from Sittingbourne. Previous clubs include Cheshunt, Kingstonian, Bognor Regis Town and Farnborough.

TREVAN ROBINSON – Young striker signed from Chertsey Town in the summer. Previous clubs include Hanwell Town (where he came through the youth team) and Farnborough.

SERINE SANNEH - The former West Ham United and Crystal Palace goalkeeper played for Hayden at Kingstonian in 2021-22. He joined the Tanners in February 2023.

FABIO SARAIVA – Summer signing from Chatham, whom he helped to win promotion to Isthmian Premier last season. Has also played for Merstham, Kingstonian, Maidstone Utd and Woking.

JUNIOR SAVANE – Young French born defender signed from Dulwich Hamlet in the summer. Previously in the Boreham Wood academy and had loan spell at Great Woking Rovers & Wingate & Finchley. Signed from East Grinstead in August 2023.

GUS SOW – The midfielder signed from Carshalton Athletic in June 2023. Gus scored fourteen goals for Kingstonian during the 2021-22 season. He spent three seasons with the K's after moving from Merstham. He previously played for Lewes, Dulwich Hamlet and St Albans City, after coming through the junior ranks at Crystal Palace.

JAMIE SPLATT – Signed from Dulwich Hamlet in 2023. A graduate of the Hamlet youth set-up, he made his first team debut in 2018. Has had loan spells at Merstham and Whitehawk.

DAVE TARPEY - Experienced striker who began his career at Henley Town before joining Basingstoke Town, Hampton & Richmond Borough, Walton & Hersham, Chertsey Town and Farnborough. Tarps joined Maidenhead United in 2014. His goals helped Maidenhead win the National League South title before he signed for Barnet in 2017. Injury curtailed his time with the Bees and he reunited with former manager Alan Dowson at Woking. In 2021 he joined Bracknell Town helping them to promotion from Isthmian Division One South Central before signing for Tanners in June 2022. In all Tarps has scored over 200 career goals.

LUTHER WILLIAMS –Spent four years at Stamford Bridge having signed for Chelsea aged 12. Joined Sheffield United on a scholarship and went on to sign a professional contract at Bramall Lane. Played for the Under 18's before injury curtailed his progress. Signed for Tanners in September 2023. Young centre-half who is calm on the ball and an aerial presence in both boxes.

LEATHERHEAD BRIEF HISTORY

LEATHERHEAD FOOTBALL CLUB can trace its history back to the formation of Leatherhead Rose in 1907. Rose were crowned Champions of the Dorking & District League in 1910 and 1919 before joining the Kingston and District League where they won the League title three times, the last in 1938-39. Leatherhead United were formed in 1924 and, in 1925-6, won Division One of the Sutton and District League. In the early 1930s, United joined the Surrey Junior League becoming Champions in 1933-4.

After the War, officials of the two clubs met and in May 1946, Leatherhead Football Club was officially formed at a public meeting. United's Fetcham Grove ground was to be used as the home ground. The Tanners went on to win four consecutive Surrey Senior League Championships before spells in the Metropolitan, Delphian and Corinthian Leagues. Tanners were Corinthian League champions in 1963 before moving into the Athenian League. Leatherhead won promotion from Division One at the end of the first season and inaugurated their floodlights with a match against a Fulham side.

Leatherhead won the Surrey Senior Cup for the first, and to date, only time in 1969. After being elected into the Isthmian League, Leatherhead made national headlines in 1974-5 when they reached the Fourth Round proper of the FA Cup, defeating League sides Colchester Utd and Brighton & Hove Albion before bowing out to First Division Leicester City 2-3. In subsequent seasons, the Tanners defeated two more Football League sides at the Grove – Cambridge United and Northampton Town.

After the disappointment of defeat in FA Amateur Cup semi-finals in 1971 and 1974, the Tanners finally reached Wembley Stadium in 1978 but were beaten in the FA Trophy Final. The Club then entered a period of decline and were relegated in 1983 and in 1990, slipped down into Division Two South but were back in Division One in 1997. Finances were a problem and in the summer of 2000, the club was within a few days of folding but was saved by its supporters who took over following a crisis meeting.

In 2006-7, Leatherhead were the lowest ranked team to reach the First Round Proper of the FA Cup, losing 1-2 at Football League side, Torquay United. Mick Sullivan was appointed First Team Manager in May 2009. Under Sullivan's guidance, the club had its most successful season in years, winning the Isthmian League Cup (the first major trophy for some 40 years) and finishing the season in fifth place in the League before losing a play-off semi-final. The following season, a dramatic play-off victory against Dulwich Hamlet (4-3 after extra time), saw The Tanners return to the Premier Division for the first time since 1983. Tanners stay lasted just the one season though. In 2013-14 Tanners reached the play offs again, this time edging out Guernsey 3-2, before winning a penalty shootout at Folkestone Invicta to return to the Ryman Premier Division.

Sammy Moore was appointed in the summer of 2017. In his first managerial job Sammy steered Tanners to the second round of the FA Cup, a County Cup Final and a top eight finish in the League before departing for Concord Rangers along with the majority of the team. He was replaced by former Margate boss Nikki Bull who, despite having to rebuild the squad, took the team to an 8th place finish narrowly missing out on the play-offs.

After a poor start to the 2021-22 season Luke Tuffs was appointed manager in January 2022. but was unable to steer the club out of the relegation places, although from a seemingly impossible position it was very close.

After an indifferent start to 2022-23 Hayden Bird was appointed to the Fetcham Grove hot seat in October 2022.
