IT'S the debate which has raged on in Non-League football for years but one which, up until now perhaps, has consistently been likened to flogging a dead horse.

But now it appears there could be light at the end of a long dark tunnel.

With all but a couple of National League clubs are operating full-time – and often out-performing many of their League Two counterparts – surely it's only right that the idea of increasing the number of promotion places from the top-flight to the Football League to three is revisited?

At their current pace, the National League's top three of Notts County, Wrexham and Chesterfield are all on to go through the 100-point barrier – and it wouldn't be a surprise if they all (only) exceeded 90.

But with just one automatic promotion spot, and six ultimately battling it out for the second place through the play-offs, there are going to be some very disappointed clubs when the bubbly has dissipated in a few months' time.

This week, NLP editor-at-large Matt Badcock spoke to three of the Football Conference's unlucky losers from over the years – Non-League legends from the last decade who missed out on promotion by the narrowest of margins, despite enjoying ground-breaking campaigns.

Wrexham fans still talk about their 98-point season. A cloud has hung around since 2012 when they missed out to Fleetwood Town by five points.

In the play-offs, they had their second chance wrecked in the semis by a Luton who finished 18 points behind.

"It's talked about all the time, the 98-point season," legendary defender Mark Creighton told us. "That was the chance we should have got out.

"To have a season as solid as that and not go up because there's only one automatic is poor – it's a kick in the b*****s of every single person who worked their nuts off to get to that position.

"Play-offs are a lottery. You have one bad game and it ruins you. That's what we had two years on the bounce. If you don't perform even for half of one of those games, it's over, it's done. That's what happened."

Kidderminster Harriers felt similar pain the following year. Steve Burr's side racked up 93 points but Mansfield Town won it on the final day, finishing two clear. Kiddy went out in the semi-finals, ironically to Wrexham.

"If I remember right, we lost the first five games and then we drew the next five," said Kyle Storer, who this week left Solihull Moors to join Nuneaton Borough. "We were bottom of the league after ten matches and didn't have a win to our name.

"Then we went 26 unbeaten. It was an incredible run and we got it to the last day of the season.

"I say we lost it on the last day, we actually lost it the week before when we drew with Woking. We were 2-0 up and should have won and it would have been in our hands.

"The biggest disappointment was we'd beaten everyone in the top six twice.

"But it was heartbreak – 93 points, put that run together and then lose the play-offs to a team 13 points below us. It was tough to take."

Steve McNulty won the title with Fleetwood and Luton Town but had to navigate the play-offs with Tranmere Rovers. They did it eventually but only a year after finishing on 95 points, four behind Lincoln City. They lost in the final to Forest Green Rovers.

Like Creighton and Storer, McNulty, now manager at Bootle, believes it's time for an extra spot.

"Obviously, I was down at Luton and they'd struggled to get out," he says. "You've got Wrexham in there now, Chesterfield and teams like that.

"But, on the other hand, it would also be good for these so-called smaller teams. I was in the league when the Cowleys took Braintree into the play-offs. It would be great for them to have that extra chance where they can get into the EFL."

As it stands, talks are currently deadlocked between the EFL and Premier League for more funding from the top-flight.

It is acknowledged, however, that the EFL have a responsibility to assist clubs further down the pyramid and the best way of achieving this, in many eyes, is by offering an additional promotion place.

And if anyone had any doubt as to whether current Non-League sides could cut the mustard, they need look no further than this week's FA Cup performances.

Wrexham recorded a fine 4-3 victory at Championship Coventry City, while Chesterfield came within a whisker of toppling West Bromwich Albion, denied only by a 94th-minute equaliser in a thrilling 3-3 draw.

Boreham Wood, mid-table in the National League gave Frank Lampard's Everton a stern test in the fifth round last season and are in the fourth round hat again after a 1-1 draw with League One Accrington Stanley.

Currently, no fewer than seven clubs in English football's third tier have come up through the Non-League system over the last decade or so, with one club, Luton Town, competing in the higher reaches of the Championship.

"It's not like they're asking for a lot – it's only one extra space," added McNulty, who eventually won promotion into the EFL three times with Fleetwood, Luton and Tranmere Rovers.

"There has got to be some compromise somewhere. They've got to bridge that gap and give clubs a chance."

Tyler Tobin – Goalkeeper signed from Ashford Town (Middlesex) in August 2019. Was a key member of the promotion chasing Uxbridge squad last season. A strong commanding goalkeeper who will once again be a key member of the squad for the upcoming season.

Matty Bonnett – Goalkeeper signed in the summer having previously seen service with Staines Town last season. Started his career at Slough Town.

Henry Grad - Young Goalkeeper who joined the club in November. Already a hero amongst the Uxbridge faithful after his heroics against Dover Athletic in the FA Trophy. Previously with Slough Town.

Mark Goodman – Full back signed from Chalfont St Peter in July 2019. Also previously played for Wingate and Finchley at step 3. A powerful full back who will be key in both the attacking and defensive patterns for the club this season.

Lewis Patrick – Left sided full back who has signed for Uxbridge after a successful season at Risborough Rangers. A versatile defender who likes to get forward and put telling crosses into the box.

Elliott Poley – Young defender signed from Ashford Town (Middlesex) in July 2019. A centre half who is now in his fourth season at Uxbridge. He reads the game well and is confident in the air.

Ryan Haugh - Left sided defender signed from Harrow Borough in 2019. Strong in the tackle and a very good crosser of the ball, especially from set pieces. Ryan has previously played for Chalfont St. Peter, Beaconsfield Town & Barton Rovers.

David Sota – Left sided defender who always gives 100% for the team. David's previous clubs include Chesham United, Potters Bar Town and Edgware Town. Has had a few injury set-backs but looks to be returning to top form.

Alan Hedley - Signed from Chalfont St Peter in July 2019. Central defender who is equally at home in the defence or midfield. Strong tackler and whose experience and calmness will be vital this season.

Harry Seabrook – A central defender who signed this summer from Tring Athletic. Has also played for Bovington in the Spartan South Midlands League. Harry is strong in the air but also has the ability to bring the ball out from the back.

Luke Paris – Luke arrived this summer from Windsor. Centre back Luke can boast international experience playing for Anguilla in the World Cup.

Mark Bitmead – A talented player who consistently scores goals at this level. Previous clubs include Ashford Town (Middlesex) where he scored just shy of 100 goals in his time at the club. Good on the ball and an influential member of the squad for this season. Was part of the Chertsey Town squad which reached the play-off final last season. Second spell at Uxbridge after scoring 18 goals in 43 appearances first time around.

Baboucarr Jarra – Babz is a strong central defender both on the floor and in the air. Was Captain of Thatcham Town when they won the FA Vase Final at Wembley in 2018 and was also bestowed with the MOM award. Previously played for AFC Hayes (Brook House), Chalfont St. Peter, Swindon Supermarine, Cirencester Town, Hungerford Town, Harrow Borough, Marlow and Beaconsfield Town.

Jack Beadle – Jack has re-joined the club having played at Hanwell Town and Chipstead in recent seasons. He likes to take on defenders and put in crosses for the forwards and is no slouch in front of goal. Other previous clubs include Egham Town, Met Police and Ashford Town (Middlesex), where he forged a lethal partnership with Mark Bitmead.

Lonit Talla – Lonit is a product of the successful youth set-up at Uxbridge. An attacking midfielder who looks at ease on the ball and likes to link up play from defence to attack. Looks to have a big future.

Alex Witham – Alex is an attacking player who can play in midfield or in a striking role. A former Arsenal youth player and has played for Derby reserves. Previous clubs include Biggleswade Town, Wealdstone, Slough Town, Wembley, Leverstock Green, Northwood and Berkhamsted.

Victor Osobu – Victor was signed from Barton Rovers to strengthen the midfield and give the front line some options in attack. Victor is vastly experienced at this level and has previously played for Beaconsfield Town, Chesham United, Hemel Hempstead Town, Chalfont St. Peter, Ware, Canvey Island, Harrow Borough, Slough Town and Hayes & Yeading United. Quick feet and direct running make him a handful for defenders.

Kensley Maloney – A tricky midfielder with a good turn of pace. Joined Uxbridge last season after a brief stay at Marlow. Other previous clubs include Beaconsfield Town, Bracknell Town, Harrow Borough and Slough Town.

Andy O'Brien – Another new signing this season having played last season in the Hanwell Town side that gained promotion via the play-offs. Cultured defender who leads by example. Links play from the back to midfield and powerful in the air.

Jordan Ireland – Midfielder who arrives from Walton Casuals. Former Harrow Borough player whose vast experience at Step 3 will be valuable for The Reds as they push for promotion in 2022/23.

Joe Jackson – A big part of the Bedfont Sports side which reached the Play-offs in 2021/22. Midfielder who skippered The Eagles and scored the winning goal against Dulwich Hamlet in the FA Cup. Brings energy and creativity to the centre of the Uxbridge side.

Presley Evans - A young skilful midfielder who looks to have a bright future in the game. Another recent acquisition having joined Uxbridge from Grays Athletic where he was a member of their Under 23's side. At just sixteen years of age he scored four goals in nine appearances for the Essex club

Dan Williams - Dan has been amongst the goals at Step 4 for a number of seasons, netting around 50 at Chalfont St Peter, Tooting and Mitcham United and Bedfont Sports. Dan joined The Reds in September from Southern Premier South League neighbours Hendon. His goals last season helped propel The Sports into the playoffs.

Scott Donnelly - Began his career at Queens Park Rangers in 2004. Has played for a number of clubs including Aldershot Town, Wycombe Wanderers, Havant & Waterlooville and Hayes & Yeading United. Vastly experienced attacking midfielder who was part of Hayes & Yeading Uniteds promotion winning side. Joined the Reds in October from Beaconsfield Town.

Fred Cummings – Assistant Manager - Joined Uxbridge from Chalfont St Peter. A UEFA B licence coach who has worked for Slough Town, Hemel Hempstead Town and Wealdstone. Played over 400 games for Uxbridge and a huge influence for the players.

Colin Finch – Logistics Manager / Club Secretary – The most important member of the group! Without Colin's support the group is unable to operate as professionally as it does. Responsible for all key issues in and around the changing room. Previously at Chalfont St. Peter, Rayners Lane & North Greenford United.

John Carroll – First Team Coach – Joined from Chalfont St Peter. A UEFA B licence coach who captained the successful Chalfont St Peter side that won promotion to step 4 football. Previous clubs include Beaconsfield Town and Luton Town

Luke Brooks-Smith – First Team Coach – Luke has joined us this season from Windsor and was previously a player at Chalfont St. Peter under Danny Edwards the current Uxbridge Manager. A UEFA B coach who leads the Uxbridge sessions and will be integral to the club's successes this season. Has spent 14 years as a coach with the Brentford Sports Trust.

Shaka Mughal – First Team Goalkeeping Coach – As a player Shaka played for Millwall and Chalfont St Peter. A huge influence and strong personality both on and off the training field. Shaka will also be responsible for 1st team full coaching sessions.

Shaun Ryan – First Team Coach - Has stepped up to the First Team coaching staff after managing the Under 23's last season and guiding them to a runners-up spot in the Suburban League Central Division.

Joseph Peacock – First Team Physio – Joined the club last season. An integral member of the management team. A fully qualified physio who gives players vital support on match days. Also responsible for players recovery and support after games.

Ki Turner – Videographer – Responsible for all recordings of Uxbridge FC games. Supports in and around all training sessions.

UXBRIDGE FOOTBALL CLUB - HISTORY

In the late 19th century the game of “football” was growing in popularity and on the 3rd February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr William Gardiner, was elected as the Club’s President and the club’s colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel. Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set-up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC.

The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874 but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year. The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname “The Reds” was born. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final. The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the clubs first season in the competition and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace.

Unfortunately, their North East rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners. During this successful period for the club they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club’s debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added “Town” to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920. A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937.

The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3. Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit.

Championship celebrations however were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow. Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War.

During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town. Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963 and club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warm-up for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0.

The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions.

In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South Central Division.

They have won the Middlesex Charity Cup on three more occasions in the last eight years. Defeating Brentford in 2013, Wembley in 2014 and Ashford Town (Middlesex) at Hanwell Town FC in 2019.

In the summer of 2016, the Club lost one of its stalwarts when long serving President Alan Odell passed away. Alan had been associated with The Reds for over 80 years, firstly as a supporter and player in his youth, before serving in various official duties as a committee member. He is sadly missed.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager over the past 51 years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18-years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019.

Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's.

Last season was the most successful in terms of league position since 2014/15 as we finished 6th missing out on the playoffs by one place we also won the Middlesex Charity Cup last season, beating Hanwell Town in the final, for the 4th time in the last 9 years

A BRIEF HISTORY OF SOUTHALL FC

The Early Days

Southall Football Club was founded in 1871, the first recorded game being a 1-0 defeat against local neighbours Uxbridge played at Southall Park on October 21st 1871.

The F.A Cup was first entered in the third year of the competition in the 1873-74 season. It was not a debut to treasure as Southall were drawn away to the mighty Wanderers who had won the competition in the first two years. The reason is not known but Southall scratched from the competition. The first victory in the F.A. Cup came the following season when they beat Leyton 5-0 after a 0-0 draw at Southall Park.

The next 20 years were spent playing friendly matches against teams in London and the Home Counties together with one season in the West London League in 1892-1893. The first piece of silverware was won in 1887 when Southall won the West Middlesex Cup overcoming Uxbridge Crescents 1-0 in the final.

Life in the Southern League

Southall were accepted into the Southern League for the 1896-97 season and remained there for nine seasons. The club achieved little success but at this time competed on equal terms with the likes of Watford, Fulham, Brighton and Thames Ironworks, now known as West Ham, as well as local rivals Brentford, who they defeated in the West Middlesex Cup Final of 1896.

In 1904 the club turned professional for what transpired to be their final Southern League season (1904-05) and this venture cost the club dear. Faced with mounting debts Southall withdrew from all competition for the following season. The club was re-organised on an amateur basis then merged with Southall Athletic and moved into a new ground at Western Road.

The Great Western Suburban League was entered in September 1907 and the Club remained there until the outbreak of the First World War. During this period the league title was won in the 1912-13 season and both the Middlesex Senior and Charity Cups were won for the first time. Indeed, Southall became cup specialists during this period including winning all 3 of their 'local' Cups, namely the Middlesex Senior, Middlesex Charity & West Middlesex Cups back to back in the 1911 & 1912 seasons.

The Athenian Years and Cup Exploits

Whilst most clubs suspended playing during the Great War Southall continued to play friendly matches, mainly against services sides and local firms teams. When hostilities ceased the club spent a season in the United Senior League. Southall were then elected into the Athenian League in September 1919 and the next twenty years was the most successful period in the history of the Club. The Athenian League championship was won in the 1926-27 season, the Middlesex Senior Cup was won five times and the Middlesex Charity Cup four times. On a national level Southall reached the final of the Amateur Cup in the 1924-25 season only to be defeated 2-1 by Clapton in front of 25230 spectators at the ground of Millwall FC. Two seasons later Southall reached the semi final of the same competition but were beaten in a replay by Leyton. The first round proper of the F.A. Cup was reached three times with no success.

The 1935-36 season was an extraordinary one in the history of the Club. Progress in cup matches was so extensive that by the end of February Southall had played 22 consecutive cup-ties. Southall became the first amateur side to battle all the way from the extra preliminary round of the F.A. Cup and reach the third round proper. It was a superb run that saw them defeat Division Three South side Swindon Town 3-1 in the first round and then trounce fellow non leaguers Newport (IOW) by 8-0 to earn a third round game against Watford.

This time in front of a record home crowd of 19094 Southall were defeated 4-1. Southall actually won nothing that season and as a result of their cup exploits they played 23 matches in 32 days to complete the Athenian League commitments including two matches on the same day on two occasions.

It was not until the 1952-53 season that Southall again hit the headlines. The team battled past Saltash, Bishop Auckland, Wealdstone and Romford to reach the semi final of the Amateur Cup. Here Southall met the renown Universities side Pegasus. The game took place at Highbury and the game ended in a hard fought 1-1 draw in front of 29982 spectators. Southall lost the replay 2-1 the following week at Craven Cottage.

The Isthmian League and Wembley Stadium

The 1960's was a quiet period in the history of the Club and in 1973 Southall were elected into the newly formed second division of the Isthmian League. In their second season in their new league Southall achieved promotion for the first time in their history when they finished as runners up to Staines Town.

Three seasons in the top flight followed, the highest position achieved being 14th in 1976-77. It was this same season that future England midfielder Alan Devonshire joined West Ham United for £5000 then a record for a player leaving an Isthmian League club.

Consecutive relegations followed into the bottom tier of the Isthmian League and in the 1985-86 season Southall again gained national recognition when they reached the FA Vase Final. Southall, with future England international Les Ferdinand in the side, lost 3-0 to Halesowen Town. Unfortunately, following the visit to Wembley, a change of manager meant the side was broken up and further success eluded the club. But worse news was waiting around the corner.

A Club in Decline

Southall suffered a major body blow in 1992 when they were forced to vacate their Western Road ground and since that time Southall FC has ground shared at a multitude of venues, sometimes many miles from the town.

At the end of the 1999-2000 season the Club was relegated to the Combined Counties League and spent five full seasons in that competition with a fourth placed finish being the highest achieved. Financial problems resulted eventually in expulsion from that league and a new life began in the Middlesex County Football League for the season 2006-2007. The first season in that competition the Club finished in a mid-table position in the premier division but problems off the field resulted in the Club being demoted yet again to Division One (Central & East).

At this time the club was really struggling financially and regular discussions were held as to the merits of keeping the club going. However, Player Manager Ryan DeCosta was determined that the club should not die and somehow managed to put a competitive team out with very little in the way of funds available. New owners appeared on the scene for the 2010-11 season with club now ground sharing at Northolt Rugby Club. For the 2011-12 season 'home' was now Hanwell Town FC and the club was dealt a further major blow with the unexpected passing of Club Secretary Geoff Harrison, a true club stalwart and without whom the club would surely have ceased to exist. Despite this setback a 3rd place finish finally meant stepping up to the Spartan South Midland League Division 1.

Oddly, with the club now effectively a 'park' team' for the first time over 100 years, the next season heralded a return to Southall as the club rented a pitch at Dormers Wells Leisure Centre from Ealing Council. The Runners Up spot was achieved, heralding promotion back to the Premier Division and another move, this time to Thames Valley University's ground in North Ealing.

At this time the club was really struggling financially and regular discussions were held as to the merits of keeping the club going. However, Player Manager Ryan DeCosta was determined that the club should not die and somehow managed to put a competitive team out with very little in the way of funds available.

New owners appeared on the scene for the 2010-11 season with club now ground sharing at Northolt

Rugby Club. For the 2011-12 season 'home' was now Hanwell Town FC and the club was dealt a further major blow with the unexpected passing of Club Secretary Geoff Harrison, a true club stalwart and without whom the club would surely have ceased to exist. Despite this setback a 3rd place finish finally meant stepping up to the Spartan South Midland League Division 1.

A Change of Fortune

Regular managerial changes meant that Southall, while now showing occasional signs of promise,

stuttered somewhat until the appointment of Paul Palmer midway through the 2015-16 season. The following season saw Southall achieve national recognition for the first time in many a year with a remarkable run to the FA Vase quarter finals, including being drawn away from home to higher level opponents for 5

consecutive rounds and putting 18 goals past them in the process, before losing out to eventual runners up Cleethorpes Town.

2017-18 started in typically chaotic fashion with the proposed ground share with Hayes and Yeading

United falling through after the season had actually started! Having been initially helped out by North Greenford United and Hillingdon Borough, Southall finally landed up at Burnham FC for "home" games. Despite this nomadic existence the players defied the odds and produced a remarkable season's football by going unbeaten in the league until 21st March. Despite the attentions of Baldock Town, Southall finally finished Division1 Champions – the club's first Championship since the 1926-27 season!

A Phoenix Rising?

Now promoted back to the Combined Counties Premier Division and hosted by Ashford Town, Southall had further reorganising to do before the start of the season as Paul Palmer left for North Greenford United, taking a fair chunk of the first team squad along with him. The club then appointed ex-player and latterly club coach Max Howell as manager, with Warren Goodhind as his assistant. With such a major upheaval at such a critical time many wondered whether the newly assembled squad would be competitive at the higher level. All such concerns were soon allayed as Max and Warren proved to be more than up to the task, achieving a more than creditable 4th place finish with an entertaining brand of attacking football. Southall were again in the promotion mix for most of the 2019-20 season and were in 5th place with games in hand when the season was abruptly ended due to the Corona virus outbreak. With a settled management team, things are looking positive heading into the 2020-21 season and onwards towards to the club's 150th anniversary in 2021-22. It looks like Southall Football Club may finally be out of the doldrums and may soon back competing at the higher end of the non-league football pyramid.
