THE **NON-LEAGUE** PAPER

BARELY 90 minutes (or should that be 110) into the new season and already football has found itself in the centre of a new storm.

Strict instructions from the International Football Association Board (IFAB) to get tough on time wasting and tot up the exact minutes for substitutions, goal celebrations, injuries etc have gone down like a lead balloon among the professional game with stars such as Manchester City's Kevin De Bruyne and Manchester United defender Raphael Varane fearing that player welfare is at risk.

In the EFL on the opening day of the season, the average time added on was over 16 minutes, but for National League players, the need for compromise is all the more important.

Clearly unaware of the storm that was to follow, National League clubs voted against increasing the number of substitutes used from three to five in the AGM of 2022, and again this summer.

As it stands, Steps 1-4 can only make three changes while Step 5 and 6 clubs are in line with the higher reaches of the game in being allowed five, in three windows.

In retrospect, by voting against an increase in subs, the National League clubs have made their bed, so to speak, but in last Sunday's NLP, Chorley manager Andy Preece, Eastleigh boss Lee Bradbury and Dorking Wanderers striker Jason Prior all expressed the need for a rethink, and the opportunity to vote again – this time with the benefit of hindsight.

"If you're going to play an extra 20 minutes a game then our levels have to wake up," the vastly experienced Preece told us.

"Premier League players are moaning but they've got five subs – we've only got three. I don't get it anyway, but now I really just do not get it. It will lead to injuries. You're going to have to change the way you train so that players last that bit longer.

"But you can't just do that. You've got to have a long-term strategy with planning through pre-season.

"I just think for this season it could be dangerous for the players and put extra stress on them. With three subs you don't have that chance to take players off and rest.

When it's Saturday-Tuesday, that's when you're going to see the difference. If you're effectively playing another half of football in a few days it's going to take its toll. We've got to change it so that five subs can come on.

"The Premier League lads have got everything at their disposal — sports scientists and all things like that. If they're talking about it and they're worried about it, what chance have we got with only three subs?

"The sooner they look at it and do it, the safer it will be, the better it will be.

"It's something that needs to be addressed as quickly as possible. If it's five from five and that helps with budgets then so be it. Ideally it would be five from seven but I just think you need to have five. We have to protect our players."

Bradbury's Eastleigh lost points to a late, late Solihull Moors equaliser on the opening day and admits that the added time changes the mindset of a manager in the dugout and his players on the field itself.

"They are trying to make it fair for everyone and for the supporters to see more football, trying to stay a step ahead of the game but where do you stop," Bradbury told us.

"It does affect the way you think a little bit, you no longer just have to get to 90 minutes, you probably have to get to 100 now.

"You are thinking about your substitutions – when you are bringing them on after 85 minutes they might have 15 minutes to play so you don't want to make your changes too early.

"With three substitutions at this level and with the amount of time that we are now likely to see added on, it is hard to get through and we probably need more substitutions. I wouldn't be surprised if most other managers said that.

"We would like to be able to make more changes but you have to keep one up your sleeve."

Prior too, has beef with the new rules. Dorking are one of a handful of clubs who operate in the top-flight on a hybrid three-day- a-week training regime, and Prior insists the extra playing time makes it even more difficult for them to compete with the league's full-timers.

"This new added time rule madness needs addressing," the striker said after Wanderers conceded a 99TH MINUTE winner to title favourites Chesterfield on the opening day. "[Playing] 94/95 minutes is hard enough on your body and is what everyone is used to. Twenty minutes added time is a joke. Saturday/Tuesday that could be an extra half of football!

"Imagine a cup game with extra time! The people implementing the rules clearly haven't considered the impact on the players and the inevitable higher injury rate. If this is going to carry on, allowing five subs is a must. If it's not broken, don't TRY and fix it.

"It's as simple as book anyone at any point in the game for obvious time wasting and go back to normal."

Prior's certainly got a point too. As the row rumbles on at Premier League HQ, there's little thought that has gone into the welfare of players at Steps 1-4 who may find themselves playing an extra half of football a week at times, often after a day's hard graft in their daytime jobs.

It's clear a five sub rule will help ease a real dilemma for both player and clubs, and voices such as Preece, Bradbury and Prior need to be heard.

The National League has the power to bring this level of football in line with the rest if that's what their member clubs desire this time. Whatever they decide, however, it's highly unlikely that the constitution will change mid-season.

That then leaves the onus with the players on the pitch and the matter at hand...timewasting. The IFAB directive has been brought in for a reason so, ultimately this season, players and managers are just going to have to wear it and get on with it!

Uxbridge Football Club are delighted to announce a long-term Ground Share arrangement with Langley Football Club.

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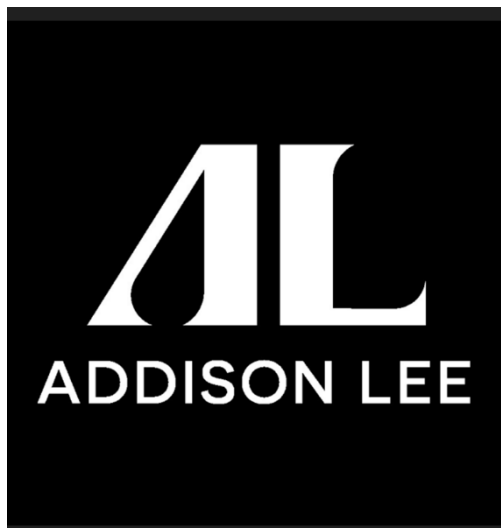
Upon completion of the current redevelopment works at Honeycroft, Langley FC will be playing their home fixtures at Horton Road.

UXBRIDGE FOOTBALL CLUB - HISTORY

In the late 19th century the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel. Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set-up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC.

The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874 but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year. The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born.

Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final. The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace.

Unfortunately, their North East rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners. During this successful period for the club they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War.

Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name.

An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920. A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3. Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit.

Championship celebrations however were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow. Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War.

During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town. Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr W.S. Try.

The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of Non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963 and club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warm-up for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0.

The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985.

The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South Central Division.

They have won the Middlesex Charity Cup on three more occasions in the last eight years. Defeating Brentford in 2013, Wembley in 2014 and Ashford Town (Middlesex) at Hanwell Town FC in 2019.

In the summer of 2016 the Club lost one of its stalwarts when long serving President Alan Odell passed away. Alan had been associated with The Reds for over 80 years, firstly as a supporter and player in his youth, before serving in various official duties as a committee member. He is sadly missed.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager over the past 51 years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18-years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019.

Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's.

The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. Last season the club had a fantastic run in the FA Trophy, reaching the 3rd Round where they lost to National League side Dagenham & Redbridge

CORINTHIAN CASUALS

ANDY GRAY ANNOUNCED AS NEW MANAGER

Corinthian-Casuals Football Club are delighted to announce that Andy Gray will take over as manager of our men's first team from the beginning of next season.

Gray will begin planning for the role immediately, while interim manager Brian Adamson continues in charge of the team until the end of the current campaign.

Gray, who played as a winger and a midfielder in a playing career that took him to the very top of English football, started out in the senior game with Corinthian-Casuals in January 1983, at the age of 18.

Under the guidance of legendary manager Billy Smith, he played a starring role in our run to the FA Cup first round proper the following season, when we bowed out to Bristol City after a replay. Among his Casuals team-mates at the time was Alan Pardew.

"It's surreal to be back," he said on accepting the role. "This is the only kind of management job I would have considered. I know what it means to play for Corinthian-Casuals and I will turn every stone for this club. I'm looking forward to getting started." Gray, 59, points to his grounding in non-league as providing the perfect remedy to help him fall in love with football again after he was released by Crystal Palace as a teenager, saying of his time with Casuals, "I didn't put any pressure on myself. I enjoyed it, and with that enjoyment it just led onto bigger and bigger things."

Those bigger things took him back to Crystal Palace and all the way to the top of the English game. He was a goalscoring hero for the Eagles as they overcame Liverpool in the FA Cup semi-final in 1990, to set up a date at Wembley. He also represented Aston Villa, QPR and Tottenham in the top

flight.

In 1991, he earned an England cap under Graham Taylor, playing against Poland in a qualifier for Euro 92. In the latter years of his career, after a season with CA Marbella, he played in a Scottish Cup Final with Falkirk, before finishing his career with spells at Bury and Millwall. To this day, Gray remains the last Corinthian-Casuals player to represent the full England team.

Andy was in attendance on Saturday as we beat Wingate and Finchley 1-0 and is looking forward to connecting with the supporters and the local community.

"Come and support us because we are going for it," he said. "I've never sat on the fence – we're going to get hungry players who want to play for this club. I'm all about getting the ball into the danger area as soon as possible to score goals. It's about entertaining, that's my philosophy. Basically, the pitch is still the same, the goals haven't moved and it's still about scoring goals.

"Corinthian-Casuals is a big name, a very big name. Look at the people connected to the club, like Micky and Alec Stewart – these are blue-chip figures in sport. So if there's a talent looking to get into, or back into, the pro game, they couldn't come anywhere better. This is a chance for them to get back on the boat.

"Our doors are open for everyone – whatever their circumstances, however they've fallen down, I'm a shoulder to lean on, someone to speak to and put them back on track, because I've been there. For me, this is where it all started and now I'm coming back... and I'm happy, I'm very happy!"

Corinthian-Casuals History

Hidden away in the suburbs of south-west London is King George's Field, home to one of the most significant clubs in the history of world football: Corinthian-Casuals.

Today Corinthian-Casuals are the leading amateur club in English football, plying their trade in the otherwise semi-professional Isthmian League Premier Division – the seventh tier of English football. Yet they can lay claim to a heritage as impressive as almost any team in the land.

The club in its modern guise was formed in 1939 as the result of a merger between two grand old amateur clubs, Corinthian FC and Casuals FC, and it was the first of those famous teams that are often credited with popularising football around the world.

The Corinthians were founded in 1882, specifically with the England national team in mind. The FA suits were tired of seeing Scotland get the better of their team and, after noting that many of the Scottish internationals were taken from one particular side, Queens Park, they set about starting a team that could act as a launching pad for the England national side. In September 1882, an administrator called Nicholas Lane Jackson, known as 'Pa' to his players, gathered the best footballers in his contacts book in a small room on the third floor of Number 28 Paternoster Row, under gaslight in the shadow of St Pauls cathedral.

The plan worked: it wasn't long before England were handing out trouncings to Scotland on a regular basis. In fact, in those early days the Corinthians provided the entire England XI for two international matches, in 1894 and 1895. Yet they stood for much more than that. In 1884, the first-ever black international footballer – Scotland full-back Andrew Watson – chose to represent the Corinthians when he moved to England.

There were characters everywhere you looked at the club in those days. The team's captain during the late Victorian period was Charles Wreford-Brown, a charismatic centre-half who is often credited with having coined the term "soccer" when he used it as an abbreviation of "association football".

The Corinthian team didn't believe in professionalism or in entering league and cup competitions, but they often played the FA Cup winners in a forerunner of the Community Shield and they were the most popular opponents when the top professional teams were looking to bring the crowds through the gate. In a sense, they were the first global superstars of football. In 1904, for example, the Corinthians defeated Manchester United 11-3 in an exhibition match in Leyton, east London, which remains the Red Devils' record defeat. Corinthians played with a stylish swagger, so much so that Real Madrid decided to adopt white jerseys in their honour.

They also took football round the world, touring in South Africa, Canada, the United States, South America and across Europe, including Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Spain, Denmark and Germany. The Corinthians' most obvious stamp on modern football is a legacy of their 1910 tour of Brazil, during which their performances so impressed the locals in Sao Paulo that they formed their own club of the same name. Corinthians Paulista went on to become one of the best-supported and most successful clubs in Brazilian football, winning the World Club Championship as recently as 2012, when they defeated Chelsea in the final.

A further trip to Brazil was aborted upon the team's arrival in 1914, owing to the outbreak of the First World War. After hearing the news, the players made the decision to return home immediately. Devastatingly, more than 100 former players of the Corinthians and the Casuals lost their lives in the war.

In 1939, the Corinthians merged with Casuals FC to form Corinthian-Casuals, wearing the pink-and-chocolate shirts of the Casuals, who had their own proud history. They were a strong force in the early amateur game, runners up in the first FA Amateur Cup Final in 1894, founder members of the Isthmian League in 1905, first holders of the A.F.A Senior Cup in 1907 and winners of the Amateur Cup in 1936.

The newly merged Corinthian-Casuals reached the FA Amateur Cup final in 1956, with England cricket star Micky Stewart among their number, but after drawing at Wembley were defeated by Bishop Auckland in a replay at Middlesbrough. They reached the semi-final the following year, but after this high point, the club slipped into a long decline, a rare moment of success seeing them reach the FA Cup first round in 1965/66, where Watford won 5-1.

1988 was a truly historic year, as the club returned to Brazil, where they faced a Corinthians legends side featuring Brazilian greats Rivellino and Socrates. Indeed, Socrates played for both sides, pulling on the pink-and-brown of the Casuals midway through the second half, in a moment that has gone down in Corinthian folklore.

The new Millennium brought plenty more historic adventures for the Corinthian-Casuals. They visited Brazil again in 2001 and, in 2007, were invited to play at the

newly reopened Wembley Stadium to celebrate 125 years of Corinthian football. Then, in 2015, they finally played the Corinthians Paulista first team for the only time in the two clubs' history. 30,000 people turned up for the momentous occasion in the Corinthians Arena after the English amateur side had been greeted at Sao Paulo airport by crowds of singing supporters. The game ended 3-0 to the Brazilian side, but there was great excitement when Jamie Byatt swapped jerseys with Corinthians captain Danilo and played the last few minutes of the game in the white and black jersey of our Paulista brothers.

It was a symbol of the rejuvenation of the Corinthian-Casuals, who have gone from strength to strength in recent years under the leadership of inspiring manager James Bracken. In 2018, after two years of pushing, they achieved promotion to the Isthmian Premier – the highest level the club has reached.

Some Amazing Facts About Corinthian-Casuals:

Corinthians were founded in 1882 by the Football Association to develop a club capable of defeating Scotland. In essence, Corinthians were the first England team.

Between 1883 and 1890, 52 of the 88 caps awarded against Scotland went to Corinthian players. In fact, in 1894 and 1895, Corinthians fielded the full England side twice... the only club to ever manage this feat.

It's acknowledged that England wear white in homage to the Corinthian strip. It's also a fact that Real Madrid, inspired by Corinthians, adopted their white strip.

However, Corinthian's greatest contribution to the game was their missionary work, touring overseas across Europe, South Africa, USA, Canada and South America.

It was on a tour to Brazil in 1910 which inspired locals to find their own team in Corinthian's honour... that club has since gone on to be the largest in South America and the only team to win the FIFA World Club Championship twice (defeating Chelsea in 2011).

Corinthians were the English club to field the first ever Black International player.

The Corinthians were so good, they regularly defeated league and FA Cup winning opponents. In fact, in 1904, they defeated Manchester United 11-3 – their heaviest defeat to this day. The centenary of that match was played in 2004 with United claiming a 3-1 victory.

In 1939, Corinthians merged with another famous club, Casuals to become the club that, to this day, resides in Tolworth, Surrey.

Corinthian-Casuals are the only club to be honoured with a Royal Coat of Arms.

Corinthian-Casuals are the highest ranked fully amateur team in Senior football. We maintain our original ethos of fair play and good sportsmanship across all levels of football.

Corinthian-Casuals has nearly 150,000 enthusiastic and avid Facebook followers – the highest following of any non-league club in the UK and more than many Football League clubs
