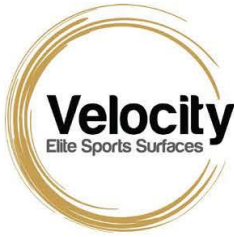

LAST week, NLP editor Matt Badcock spoke in his column about the alarming trend of fan misbehaviour which is sadly creeping into our game.

Believe me, it's not something we take any enjoyment from, but it came to a head one Saturday night as we were preparing to put the paper to bed.

The original plan was to celebrate a National League record crowd at Notts County when a massive 16,511 supporters clicked through the turnstiles to see the Magpies take on Yeovil Town.

On the same day, there were over 10,000 watching Wrexham play Aldershot Town and another 7,000+ crowd at Chesterfield for the crunch clash with Solihull Moors.

So, you can imagine our angst when instead of 16,511 fans making the front page headlines it the actions of just one idiot who stole the limelight.

About an hour before we went to press, a video was brought to our attention of a so-called Guiseley 'fan' jumping over the barrier of Warrington Town's Cantilever Park ground and switching the water bottle of Wire keeper Tony Thompson which was nestled into the net.

It then emerged that the bottle in question had apparently been contaminated with urine. Thompson drank it and then approached the alleged perpetrator, prompting him to be sent off.

The front page headline 'Disgusting' said it all.

While, thankfully, this is a one-off incident it has once again raised concerns of bad fans' behaviour, which is dragging the pure reputation Non-League football through the mud.

With the Premier League and Championship on hold for the World Cup, Non-League clubs up and down the country have worked extremely hard putting on special deals, trying to pack their bars and clubhouses for people to watch the action in Qatar and to generally propel this level of the game into the wider spotlight. A celebration of Non-League football if you like.

As Matt rightly pointed out, the frustration is these incidents don't appear to be isolated. On a number of occasions this season we've had to report unsavoury instances of poor behaviour inside football grounds.

At the start of the season, the Football Association and leagues issued a document to clubs in an attempt to help eradicate some of the issues.

The problem is, what can clubs do to prevent it? Guiseley handled this particular incident expertly well. They immediately banned the young man involved and vowed to clamp down on any accomplices. They deserve credit for their own swift action on what would have been a difficult weekend for them.

Unfortunately, preventative methods are having consequences on the terraces – and it's a real sad state of affairs. Clubs such as Walsall Wood and Prescot Cables are refusing entry for under 16s without a supervised adult and at Coalville Town the ground staff are even wearing body cams in a bid to identify persistent offenders.

As necessary as measures like that are, they represents everything that Non-League football shouldn't. We should be encouraging the support of the younger generation and we certainly shouldn't have to follow them round the ground on camera. Sadly, it's needs must.

It seems that the pure nature of a Non-League ground makes it an easy target. While elite stadiums are regimented so fans are confined to one seat and one entry/exit gate, a Non-League ground gives fans the freedom to wonder around and sit or stand where they want. That is being taken advantage of.

Don't get me wrong, 99 per cent of football fans, and Non-League fans in general, are decent folk. They just there to watch a game, support the club and enjoy the day. It's vital we don't tar everyone with the same brush.

Record numbers are turning to Non-League football for its integrity and its purity. Let's not let the proud reputation of our game be ruined by the few.

Henry Grad - Young Goalkeeper who joined the club in November. Already a hero amongst the Uxbridge faithful after his heroics against Dover Athletic in the FA Trophy. Previously with Slough Town.

Mark Goodman – Full back signed from Chalfont St Peter in July 2019. Also previously played for Wingate and Finchley at step 3. A powerful full back who will be key in both the attacking and defensive patterns for the club this season.

Lewis Patrick –Left sided full back who has signed for Uxbridge after a successful season at Risborough Rangers. A versatile defender who likes to get forward and put telling crosses into the box.

Elliott Poley – Young defender signed from Ashford Town (Middlesex) in July 2019. A centre half who is now in his fourth season at Uxbridge. He reads the game well and is confident in the air.

Ryan Haugh - Left sided defender signed from Harrow Borough in 2019. Strong in the tackle and a very good crosser of the ball, especially from set pieces. Ryan has previously played for Chalfont St. Peter, Beaconsfield Town & Barton Rovers.

David Sota – Left sided defender who always gives 100% for the team. David's previous clubs include Chesham United, Potters Bar Town and Edgware Town. Has had a few injury set-backs but looks to be returning to top form.

Alan Hedley - Signed from Chalfont St Peter in July 2019. Central defender who is equally at home in the defence or midfield. Strong tackler and whose experience and calmness will be vital this season.

Harry Seabrook – A central defender who signed this summer from Tring Athletic. Has also played for Bovingdon in the Spartan South Midlands League. Harry is strong in the air but also has the ability to bring the ball out from the back.

Luke Paris – Luke arrived this summer from Windsor. Centre back Luke can boast international experience playing for Anguilla in the World Cup.

Josh Andrew – A vastly experienced no nonsense right sided defender who has played for many clubs at this level. They include Harrow Borough, Ashford Town (Middlesex), Chipstead and Hayes & Yeading United.

Mark Bitmead – A talented player who consistently scores goals at this level. Previous clubs include Ashford Town (Middlesex) where he scored just shy of 100 goals in his time at the club. Good on the ball and an influential member of the squad for this season. Was part of the Chertsey Town squad which reached the play-off final last season. Second spell at Uxbridge after scoring 18 goals in 43 appearances first time around.

Baboucarr Jarra – Babz is a strong central defender both on the floor and in the air. Was Captain of Thatcham Town when they won the FA Vase Final at Wembley in 2018 and was also bestowed with the MOM award. Previously played for AFC Hayes (Brook House), Chalfont St. Peter, Swindon Supermarine, Cirencester Town, Hungerford Town, Harrow Borough, Marlow and Beaconsfield Town.

Jack Beadle – Jack has re-joined the club having played at Hanwell Town and Chipstead in recent seasons. He likes to take on defenders and put in crosses for the forwards and is no slouch in front of goal. Other previous clubs include Egham Town, Met Police and Ashford Town (Middlesex), where he forged a lethal partnership with Mark Bitmead.

Lonit Talla – Lonit is a product of the successful youth set-up at Uxbridge. An attacking midfielder who looks at ease on the ball and likes to link up play from defence to attack. Looks to have a big future.

Alex Witham – Alex is an attacking player who can play in midfield or in a striking role. A former Arsenal youth player and has played for Derby reserves. Previous clubs include Biggleswade Town, Wealdstone, Slough Town, Wembley, Leverstock Green, Northwood and Berkhamsted.

Victor Osobu – Victor was signed from Barton Rovers to strengthen the midfield and give the front line some options in attack. Victor is vastly experienced at this level and has previously played for Beaconsfield Town, Chesham United, Hemel Hempstead Town, Chalfont St. Peter, Ware, Canvey Island, Harrow Borough, Slough Town and Hayes & Yeading United. Quick feet and direct running make him a handful for defenders.

Kensley Maloney – A tricky midfielder with a good turn of pace. Joined Uxbridge last season after a brief stay at Marlow. Other previous clubs include Beaconsfield Town, Bracknell Town, Harrow Borough and Slough Town.

Andy O'Brien – Another new signing this season having played last season in the Hanwell Town side that gained promotion via the play-offs. Cultured defender who leads by example. Links play from the back to midfield and powerful in the air.

Jordan Ireland – Midfielder who arrives from Walton Casuals. Former Harrow Borough player whose vast experience at Step 3 will be valuable for The Reds as they push for promotion in 2022/23.

Joe Jackson – A big part of the Bedfont Sports side which reached the Play-offs in 2021/22. Midfielder who skippered The Eagles and scored the winning goal against Dulwich Hamlet in the FA Cup. Brings energy and creativity to the centre of the Uxbridge side.

Maurice Nugent - “Mo” spent seven successful seasons at Galway United in the League of Ireland, before re-locating to London with his work. A classy player who is equally at home in defence or midfield. Had a short spell at Hendon last season in the Southern League Premier Division.

Presley Evans - A young skilful midfielder who looks to have a bright future in the game. Another recent acquisition having joined Uxbridge from Grays Athletic where he was a member of their Under 23's side. At just sixteen years of age he scored four goals in nine appearances for the Essex club

Dan Williams - Dan has been amongst the goals at Step 4 for a number of seasons, netting around 50 at Chalfont St Peter, Tooting and Mitcham United and Bedfont Sports. Dan joined The Reds in September from Southern Premier South League neighbours Hendon. His goals last season helped propel The Sports into the playoffs.

Andy Ofosu - Experienced striker who was part of Bracknell Town's Championship winning side last season. Andy has also seen service at Staines Town, AFC Dunstable, Walton Casuals, Northwood, Berkhamsted and Hayes & Yeading United. Player who will add a cutting-edge to The Reds attack.

Scott Donnelly - Began his career at Queens Park Rangers in 2004. Has played for a number of clubs including Aldershot Town, Wycombe Wanderers, Havant & Waterlooville and Hayes & Yeading United. Vastly experienced attacking midfielder who was part of Hayes & Yeading United's promotion winning side. Joined the Reds in October from Beaconsfield Town.

Gareth Chendlik - Joined the Reds from local rivals Hanwell Town, where he was regularly amongst the goals. Popular player both on and off the pitch. His experience will be vital in our push for promotion.

Stephane Bombelenga - Forward who joined the club from East Grinstead Town. His pace and trickery make him a handful for defenders. Previous clubs include Gosport Borough, Eastbourne Borough and Leatherhead.

Management Team:

Danny Edwards – First Team Manager – Previously at Chalfont St Peter for 15 seasons as manager. Oversaw the club's promotion to step 4 and an FA Vase semi-final. Previously worked at Chelsea FC and Southampton FC and an UEFA A-Licence coach.

Fred Cummings – Assistant Manager - Joined Uxbridge from Chalfont St Peter. A UEFA B licence coach who has worked for Slough Town, Hemel Hempstead Town and Wealdstone. Played over 400 games for Uxbridge and a huge influence for the players.

Colin Finch – Logistics Manager / Club Secretary – The most important member of the group! Without Colin's support the group is unable to operate as professionally as it does. Responsible for all key issues in and around the changing room. Previously at Chalfont St. Peter, Rayners Lane & North Greenford United.

John Carroll – First Team Coach – Joined from Chalfont St Peter. A UEFA B licence coach who captained the successful Chalfont St Peter side that won promotion to step 4 football. Previous clubs include Beaconsfield Town and Luton Town

Luke Brooks-Smith – First Team Coach – Luke has joined us this season from Windsor and was previously a player at Chalfont St. Peter under Danny Edwards the current Uxbridge Manager. A UEFA B coach who leads the Uxbridge sessions and will be integral to the club's successes this season. Has spent 14 years as a coach with the Brentford Sports Trust.

Shaka Mughal – First Team Goalkeeping Coach – As a player Shaka played for Millwall and Chalfont St Peter. A huge influence and strong personality both on and off the training field. Shaka will also be responsible for 1st team full coaching sessions.

Shaun Ryan – First Team Coach - Has stepped up to the First Team coaching staff after managing the Under 23's last season and guiding them to a runners-up spot in the Suburban League Central Division.

Joseph Peacock – First Team Physio – Joined the club last season. An integral member of the management team. A fully qualified physio who gives players vital support on match days. Also responsible for players recovery and support after games.

Ki Turner – Videographer – Responsible for all recordings of Uxbridge FC games. Supports in and around all training sessions.

UXBRIDGE FOOTBALL CLUB - HISTORY

In the late 19th century the game of “football” was growing in popularity and on the 3rd February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr William Gardiner, was elected as the Club’s President and the club’s colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel. Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set-up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC.

The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874 but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year. The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname “The Reds” was born. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final. The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club’s first season in the competition and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesbrough in the final at Crystal Palace.

Unfortunately, their North East rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners. During this successful period for the club they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club’s debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added “Town” to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920. A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937.

The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3. Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit.

Championship celebrations however were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow. Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War.

During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town. Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963 and club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warm-up for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0.

The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions.

In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South Central Division.

They have won the Middlesex Charity Cup on three more occasions in the last eight years. Defeating Brentford in 2013, Wembley in 2014 and Ashford Town (Middlesex) at Hanwell Town FC in 2019.

In the summer of 2016, the Club lost one of its stalwarts when long serving President Alan Odell passed away. Alan had been associated with The Reds for over 80 years, firstly as a supporter and player in his youth, before serving in various official duties as a committee member. He is sadly missed.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager over the past 51 years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18-years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019.

Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's.

Last season was the most successful in terms of league position since 2014/15 as we finished 6th missing out on the playoffs by one place we also won the Middlesex Charity Cup last season, beating Hanwell Town in the final, for the 4th time in the last 9 years

MARK BARTLEY Manager who as a player was at Hayes, Slough Town, Burnham and Thame United before taking over at Reading Town in the latter part of season 2011/2012 and guiding them to safety. PHIL BROWN Goalkeeping coach (who makes an occasional appearance) and is in his sixth season here. Previously a professional with Reading F.C.

AARON STEADMAN Joined this season as First Team Coach having previous experience with Chalfont St.Peter, Bracknell Town, Ascot United, Maidenhead United and the Berks & Bucks representative side.

MO AYOUB Goalkeeper who was on the books of Chesterfield as a youngster and more recently was with Thatcham Town and Reading City.

JUNAID BELL Combative midfielder who arrived via the John Majedski academy and who has any eye for a goal. Debut 08/11/18.

JORDAN BROWN Skilful forward/midfielder who tends to play in the wider positions and who signed after a successful spell with Highmoor-Ibis of the Hellenic League. Member of the FA Vase winning side whilst with Thatcham Town who has also played at Bracknell Town. Debut 08/08/15.

TRISTAN CAMPBELL Left-sided midfielder who has arrived via Beaconsfield, Highmoor-Ibis and Binfield, missed most of season 20/21 through injury Debut. 11/08/17.

CURTIS CHAPPLE Quick, hard tackling defender who likes to get forward and chips in with the odd important goal, Debut 29/08/16.

GEORGES EHUI Attacking full back who has previously played for Wycombe Wanderers , Waltham amongst others. Debut 14/08/21.

JENSON MANSEL Youngster who is another to have come to the club through the John Majedski Academy.

BEN MULLEY Last season was a member of Slough Town's under 23s and has also played at Holyport. Debut 13/08/22.

CHRIS OVENDEN Right-sided defender or midfielder who was with Henley Town before joining and who has also played for Hartley Wintney. Season 2014-15 Manager's Player-Of-The-Year and 2015-16 Supporters Player of the Season. Debut 10/11/12.

DAWID ROGALSKI Played professionally in his native Poland and for Chalfont St. Peter here in the UK. Scored a hat-trick on his debut v Walton & Hersham Debut 13/08/22.

LOUIS ROGERS Composed midfielder or defensive player who signed following his release from Watford FC. Supporters' Player Of the Season for the last 2 years. Debut 18/09/18.

ALEX SALMON Tall and very quick defender who can play anywhere across the back four. Joined from Reading Town to become very important in Hellenic League title win before injury ruined the following 18 months for him. 2015-16 Player of the Season. Debut 07/08/12.

CURTIS UJAH Commanding defender who first signed in September 2019 from Cheshunt FC having been with Egham Town previously. Debut 31/08/19. Last season was with East Thurrock United.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF MARLOW F.C.

It was on November 22nd, 1870, at the Compleat Angler Hotel on the banks of the Thames that Great Marlow Football Club was formed and so began the history of one of the oldest clubs in the country. In the last century, the Club was a major force in the game and as one of the original entrants in the first F.A Cup competition in 1871/72 contributed a share of the £25 that bought the first trophy. In the very first year of the competition a certain Cuthbert Ottaway turned out for Marlow and just a year later he was to captain the national side against Scotland in the first ever officially recognised international match.

Marlow have the unique distinction of being the only club to have applied for entry to every competition since its inception although they were unable to compete once in the 1910/11 season. In 1882 they reached the semi-finals where they lost out to eventual winners Old Etonians 0-5 at the Oval. Two Amateur Cup semi-finals and a host of Berks & Bucks Senior Cup wins were among many honours won in this golden age. In 1894 Marlow rejected the opportunity to join the newly-formed Southern League in order to retain their amateur status and allowed Tottenham Hotspur to begin their climb to the top flight by taking their place

The Club's ground until 1919 was Crown Meadow, now the Riley Recreational Ground. An enforced move to the Star Meadow (which was unfenced) and the worsening financial situation resulted in the need to play in a more local competition than the Great Western Suburban League and Marlow joined the Reading and District League. This was a dark period for the Club and worse was to come when the Club's long-serving Honorary Secretary Alfred Davis, who had held office at the Club since 1891, died in 1924. It was decided that a fitting memorial to him would be to provide a permanent home for Marlow F.C. An appeal proved to be very successful and the "Alfred Davis Memorial Ground" saw its first game in 1928. The picturesque grandstand dates from 1930's and followed the establishment of an Association who issued Share Certificates in connection with a Building Fund and was built to celebrate the Club's revival and the Spartan League Division Two championship.

Apart from a war-time break Marlow continued in the Spartan League until 1965 when entry was gained to the Athenian League Division Two. Promotion to Division One was secured in season 1970/71. Here Marlow remained until 1984 when they joined the Isthmian League. Having finished bottom of Division Two in 1985 the appointment of Mike Keen as Manager heralded a rapid rise in status. Promotion to Division One came the very next season and then after just one season in Division One the championship was won after a two horse race with Grays Athletic and along with its promotion to the Premier Division.

Here Marlow found things much tougher and Christmas arrived without a win and from a position at the foot of the table, however a late season Houdini act saw them escape and secure their new-found status. When Keen left his assistant Dave Russell took over and brought in Laurie Craker as Coach.

Under them good times returned and the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup was won for the first time that century with a victory over local rivals Wycombe Wanderers and the F.A Cup First Round was reached, also for the first time that century, with an away tie at West Bromwich Albion the reward. Season 1992/93 saw even more F.A Cup success with progression this time to the Third Round and a tie with Tottenham Hotspur that was switched to White Hart Lane where almost 27000 saw the Blues give a very creditable performance. The Diadora (Isthmian) League Cup was won to finish the season on a high note by beating Molesey.

1993/94 must rate as the most successful ever with Marlow again reaching the First Round of the F.A Cup where a 0-2 home defeat against Plymouth Argyle was featured on T.V, while in the league a highest-ever position of third was achieved. The Berks & Bucks Senior Cup was won again with a 1-0 win over local rivals Chesham Utd. to round off a highly memorable season.

At the end of that season Russell and Craker left for Slough Town and took several players with them. A new squad and slow start left a lot to do in the league and relegation followed. In the F.A Cup things were very different. The First Round saw Division Two table-toppers Oxford Utd. defeated 2-0 at Oak Tree Road and the Blues became the first winners of the Littlewoods Pools' Giant Killers award. After another home victory over Trophy holder's Woking secured a place in the Third Round Proper once again and a trip to Swindon Town, who had been in the Premier League the season before, where the home side were grateful to progress by a 2-0 scoreline.

Season 1995/96 saw a finish in eighth spot but the following one got off to a terrible start from which the Club was never able to recover – and despite victories over virtually all the top sides, relegation was confirmed on the last day of the season. Russell returned for the following season and with him high hopes but the season proved to be one of under-achievement and a new team of Graham Pritchard and Derek Sweetman took over for 1998/99 and provided a period of stability which saw finishes in mid-table. Following the departure of Pritchard just before season 2001/02 Sweetman took over the reins and his first game in charge saw the capture of the Associate Members Trophy in a final held over from the previous season. The side finished the season in 9th position in the league – the highest for some time – before restructuring saw them move from Division Two to the newly-formed Division One North for season 2002/03 where an 11th place finish was achieved. In the F.A Trophy they progressed to the Third Round before going out at Dagenham & Redbridge. Marlow were moved yet again to Division One South and although inconsistent form saw them finish 16th in the league they again had an excellent run in the F.A Trophy which took them to the Fourth Round for the first time in their history. Several notable victories saw them through before a strong Tamworth outfit ended their run at Oak Tree Road.

The reorganization of the non-league game saw them in different surroundings for the fourth time in four seasons with entry into The Southern League, Western Division for season 2004/05 and a finishing 13th spot. Kevin Stone had moved into the manager's seat towards the end of the season and enjoyed a great run. 2005/06 and in the same league and in more familiar surroundings seemed to suit the side and for most of the season they hovered around the play-off positions and eventually finished in 6th spot. A play-off spot was confirmed on the final day of the season and although a 1-2 defeat at Brackley Town followed the Club were pleased with the progress.

Season 2006/07 in the South & West Division saw a successful run of results promise another play-off berth but a last day defeat at Winchester City saw them fall just short whilst season 2007/08 was a little more disappointing with some very good results failing to offset a poor run around February/March with a final finish just outside the play-offs following..

Season 2008/09 saw the Club moved yet again into the Midland Division and another inconsistent season followed finishing with a defeat to Windsor & Eton in the final of the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup at M.K Dons stadium. The following two seasons saw some good results against the top sides but indifferent ones against the lower teams and ended with mid-table finishes even though a bright start in 2010/11 saw them briefly at the top of the table. 2011/12 did not start at all badly but soon developed into one where victories were very hard to come by and following a string of poor results long-standing manager Stone left just after Christmas. Assistant Steve Croxford took over and although performances and results improved towards the end it was not enough to avoid relegation.

Season 2012/13 found Marlow in in the UHlsport Hellenic League with a new management team headed by Mark Bartley eager to recapture some of the glories of the past and this they did, winning the league championship by a 16 point margin and scoring 123 goals in 36 games to return to the Southern League where the next two seasons saw them consolidate with finishes in 17th and 11th positions, respectively.

For 2015/16 Marlow were moved once again – to the South & West division – which again meant increased travelling and the loss of some key players and several local derbies, making life much more difficult and a mid-table finish was achieved. A return to the Central Division for 2016/17 aided a finish in 4th place (on goal difference) and achieved a play-off place, with third-placed Barton Rovers running out 2-0 victors at their ground. Season 2017/18 saw a mid-table finish followed by a return to the Isthmian League after a lengthy absence to take a place in the newly-formed South-Central division with a resultant reduction in travelling which is most welcome. Here generally good results saw them maintain a position near the top of the table throughout the season and qualify for the play-offs where they lost out in the semi-final to eventual winners Cheshunt 1-2 on their ground.. Back “home” the Blues have settled in and despite the curtailment of the next 2 seasons have retained the core of those players and added some quality for 2021/2022.

Last season saw an excellent start and a position at or near the top of the table throughout but a dismal run of results in the final months lost the early momentum. What it did do however was to highlight the quality of the squad and lead to many players being poached to join clubs at a higher level in the pyramid giving Manager Bartley the task of rebuilding the squad as he enters his eleventh season at the helm.
