A SUNNY weekday morning, a little before 9.30am and a corner kick away from Wembley Stadium, Hanwell Town are opening up their ground for assessment.

It's part of the intensive drive to look in depth at all Step 3-6 grounds in the National League System by the end of October, with National League clubs to get the same treatment later in the season.

The NLP has been invited along to see what we'd traditionally know as a ground grading in action.

Launched at the end of July, the FA and Premier League have joined forces to launch the Stadium Accreditation Programme.

For the first time since ground grading was introduced over 15 years ago, the process has been digitalised with a new tool called StadiumPower.

Think of this process as a giant audit of Non-League grounds to essentially answer the questions: What have we got? Where are the challenges and areas of need? And, crucially, how can funding be best utilised?

"Up until now, although many will be surprised at this, there has been no central database capturing not just facility information but also the nuances around it," Mark Harris, chairman of The FA's Stadium Accreditation sub-committee, tells The NLP.

"So digitalisation will give us a central database of facilities. It will allow us to identify areas of non-compliance but, more importantly, look at common areas of non-compliance.

"It's about identifying big issues that can then be linked to funding. I don't want to set any hares running but, as an example, if we found there were high numbers of perimeter fencing not compliant for whatever reason, that enables a business case to be put together to talk to funding partners like the Premier League Stadium Fund and say: There is a common need here. Let's look at whether we should focus some funding on the bigger problems club face.

"It is not there as a bigger stick to beat clubs with. It's to bring transparency and also ensure impartiality."

That and consistency are key. Previously, grading at Steps 1-4 was handled centrally by The FA, with Steps 5 and 6 overseen by leagues themselves.

Naturally, and understandably, that has led to a variation across the country.

Stadium Accreditation assessors – 25 of them all trained together – are now undertaking the mammoth task to visit around 820 individual National League System grounds.

As part of this year one assessment, at least 400 individual items at each stadium are being recorded – of those, 160 linked to the ground grading criteria for 2023-24.

There are nine sections to be filled in by the assessor, accompanied by a league observer.

It starts with general information like ground details and who uses the pitch. Then entrances and exits, clubhouse details, how big is the clubhouse and how many can it hold. Spectator information and capacities, standing and seating.

Other areas include Medical & Safety, Pitch & Floodlights, Transport & Parking, Media & Broadcast.

With the app, photos and videos can now be taken and instantly uploaded to give a literal picture of what each ground has.

A key part of this fact-finding information will link into those extras. The FA can get an idea of suitable ground stock for England youth games as well as to aid the exploding growth of women's football to help clubs get permanent bases. Likewise, it will help the FA Competitions team at Wembley HQ with their planning.

Women's Super League games require an anti-doping room. Is there one available? It all goes into the app.

An important note, nothing in respect to the actual grading criteria has changed. But the in-depth collection of data will be reviewed by The FA's now monthly-meeting Stadium Accreditation Sub Committee.

"It may well be that arising from this first round of inspections that it actually highlights some changes we may need to think about making to criteria going forward," Harris says.

StadiumPower will allow clubs to keep tabs on their own improvements, give transparency on other clubs and there will be a public-facing element so the everyday fan can see what facilities they may attend.

Another feature of the app will be a stadium simulation tool where a club can, at the click of a button, see what work is required should they be promoted to the level above.

"This is about trying to move the mindset from compliance to opportunity," Harris says.

Nearly three hours on and there are still areas to be looked at, measured and photographed. But it's another one ticked off the list with the vision for a stronger Non-League game at the end of it.

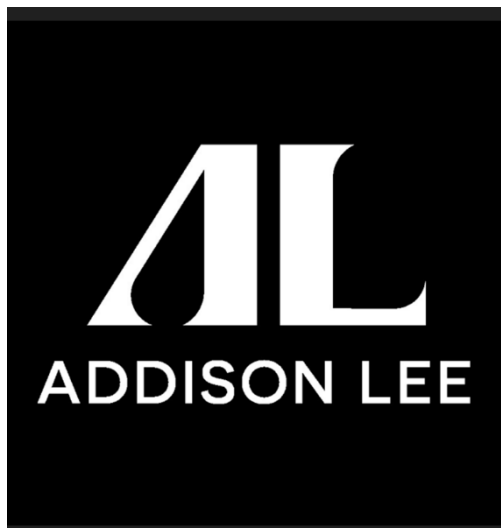
Upon completion of the current redevelopment works at Honeycroft, Langley FC will be playing their home fixtures at Horton Road.

UXBRIDGE FOOTBALL CLUB - HISTORY

In the late 19th century the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel. Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set-up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC.

The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874 but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year. The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born.

Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final. The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace.

Unfortunately, their North East rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners. During this successful period for the club they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War.

Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name.

An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920. A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3. Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit.

Championship celebrations however were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow. Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War.

During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town. Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr W.S. Try.

The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of Non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963 and club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warm-up for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0.

The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985.

The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South Central Division.

They have won the Middlesex Charity Cup on three more occasions in the last eight years. Defeating Brentford in 2013, Wembley in 2014 and Ashford Town (Middlesex) at Hanwell Town FC in 2019.

In the summer of 2016 the Club lost one of its stalwarts when long serving President Alan Odell passed away. Alan had been associated with The Reds for over 80 years, firstly as a supporter and player in his youth, before serving in various official duties as a committee member. He is sadly missed.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager over the past 51 years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18-years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019.

Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's.

The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. Last season the club had a fantastic run in the FA Trophy, reaching the 3rd Round where they lost to National League side Dagenham & Redbridge

THATCHAM TOWN FC SQUAD

Goalkeepers

TOBY FISHER – Following a successful loan spell last season Toby has signed permanently for the Kingfishers. After arriving from National League side Aldershot Town in November '22 he kept 8 clean sheets to help Thatcham climb the table.

SAM WHEELER – A former Oxford City youngster who moved to Thatcham in July '23. Impressed during training sessions last season and the Kingfishers will benefit from his shot-stopping and long clearances.

Defenders

JOSH BLACKWOOD – A player the club have been keen to sign for a while. Having returned from a bad knee injury, Josh's experience and composure on the ball will prove highly useful for this relatively young squad.

OLI BOURNE – Graduated from the club's youth set up and made 30 appearances last season at centre-back. On dual registration with Reading City of the Combined Counties League to further his footballing development.

NOAH COATES – The club's youth team captain who broke into the first team towards the back end of last season. Looked very comfortable at centre-back and would have made more than 4 appearances but for injury.

LEWIS FRANCIS – A left-sided defender who arrived from Finchampstead in July '22 but suffered a season-ending knee injury in his fourth appearance. Will be hoping to continue his rehabilitation and get back on the pitch this season.

TINASHE GWAVAVA – Returned from a long spell on the side-lines at the end of last season and immediately showed the fans what they'd been missing, with high energy performances down the right flank and quality deliveries into the box.

LEVI HEHOLT – A versatile defender who has previously played US College football and is making up for lost time after returning from a serious knee injury. Made 21 appearances last season and is a strong character at the back.

CONNOR JEANES – A defender who is very comfortable on the ball and wins his fair share of headers. Connor, who played in the Combined Counties League for Windsor last season, is expected to be a great asset for the club.

AARON WHITE - Central defender on a work experience deal from Reading FC. Impressed in the pre-season friendly between the clubs and is great with the ball at his feet and in one-on-one situations.

Midfielders

MO CEESAY – A versatile and reliable player who added goals to his game last season, scoring 8 in 36 appearances. Has become a key player across the park since joining from Flackwell Heath in November '21.

HARRY HOATH – A commanding presence with an eye for goal, who will add steel to Town's midfield. Previously with Holyport, where he won Football In Berkshire's goal of the month for September '22, before moving to Binfield.

NATHAN JONES – Now in his third season in the Kingfishers' engine-room, Nathan is a hard worker who keeps the team ticking over and does the ugly things well. Has been appointed club captain in recognition of his growing influence and experience.

CAMERON ROHART-BROWN – Another player who is comfortable in a number of positions, from left-back to centre-forward. Cam is a dead-ball specialist who returned from Binfield in September '22, scoring 11 goals to pick up the club's golden boot.

DAN SMITH – A youth teamer who broke into the first team towards the end of last season and looked at home with the step up to senior football. A combative player who likes to win the ball in the middle of the park and keep possession.

SAM TANNER – A product of the John Madejski Academy who gained experience with Reading City last season. Sam is a dynamic player with a great work ethic and is a signing that the management team are excited about for the new season.

CALLUM WILLMOTH – With over 200 appearances in several spells for Thatcham, it was a coup to capture the signature of holding midfielder Cal, who has captained Hungerford Town in the Conference South over the last few seasons.

Forwards

JORDAN ALVES – Skilful forward who will cause defences problems with his trickery and ability in dead-ball situations. Returned to the club in January '23 following a year with Southern League side North Leigh.

JUSTIN BANGURA – A hard-working forward who is a recent graduate from Reading FC's John Madejski Academy. Will cause problems for defences this season with his work rate and trickery.

JORDAN BROWN – A forward with lots of experience in step four, most recently with Marlow. A skilful front-man who played for Town in the 2017/18 season and won the penalty at Wembley which led to Thatcham winning the FA Vase.

OWEN CLARK – A former Brentford and Oxford United youth player who demonstrated his talent while training with the club at the end of last season and impressed down the left channel in Thatcham's pre-season friendlies.

Forwards

CLEM DUODU – Lively youth team winger who linked up with the first team during pre-season. Will cause problems down the flanks with his raw pace and enthusiasm.

LEWIS HAYES - Making a big step up from Tilehurst Albion but wasn't fazed in pre-season friendlies against higher level opposition where he made a strong impact.

CHRISTIAN JOHNSON - An athletic forward, great with his back to goal, who has signed on loan from Maidenhead United. Scored 20 goals last season for Holyport and won Football in Berkshire's Young Player of the Season award.

JACK TIMBERLAKE - Another player on work experience from Reading FC who will bring great energy to the team and definitely has an eye for goal.

Management

YASHWA ROMEO – A hugely experienced non-league striker, who represented Thatcham Town FC as a player (83 appearances, 32 goals), coach (FA Vase winner at Wembley) and Assistant Manager, before taking over as Manager in March '22.

SHAUN ALLAWAY – Goalkeeper who spent time with Reading and Leeds United in his youth and represented England at Under 19 level. Enjoyed long spells with Staines Town and Slough Town and joined Thatcham's coaching staff in 2020.

SAM LOADES – An experienced and passionate youth coach who works with Reading FC. Sam joined Thatcham Town's coaching staff in March '22 and the club are currently benefiting from his wisdom and insight.

DECLAN DOWLING – Declan is in his sixth season serving as the club's physio. Working as a physiotherapist in nearby Reading, he has footballing experience from similar roles in his native Ireland, most recently with Sligo Rovers.

COLIN CHARLES – Colin joined the club's backroom staff in August '21 and is an infectious character around The Metal Stadium. He performs a number of roles at the club, from kit man, turnstile operator to player liaison officer.

THATCHAM TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB'S HISTORY

Thatcham Town Football Club was founded in 1894. The club were originally known just as Thatcham, with Town being added to its name in 1974. In the early years Thatcham played at The Marsh on Dunston Green, Brownsfield (home of the Cricket Club) and Station Road, before moving to Lancaster Close in 1949. Floodlights were erected in January 1983 with Fulham FC visiting for a commemorative friendly match. To provide improved facilities, the club moved to Waterside Park in 1992/93, with the ground becoming known as The Stacatruc Stadium from August 2019, then the Metal Stadium from August 2023.

The club joined the **Reading Temperance League** in 1896, winning the Division Two title in 1905/06. In 1953 Thatcham became founder members of the **Hellenic League**, winning promotion to the Premier Division as Division One champions in 1958/59, 1964/65 & 1972/73, then claiming the Premier Division title in 1974/75. Following spells in the **Athenian** and **London Spartan Leagues**, Thatcham joined the newly formed **Wessex League** in 1986 and won the title in 1995/96. After finishing second in 2005/06, ground requirements were met and promotion to step four was achieved.

The Kingfishers spent eight seasons in the **Southern League** Division One – seven in the South & West Division and one (2012/13) in the Central. Following sixth-place finishes in both 2006/07 & 2008/09, the club achieved its highest ever position in 2010/11... Despite being in the bottom half of the table at Christmas, Thatcham earned 38 points from the final 15 matches to finish in fifth, however the Kingfishers were beaten at Sholing in the play-off semi-final.

Once safety was assured in 2013/14, the club resigned from the **Southern League** to cut costs by playing at a lower level. Town finished twelfth in their first campaign back in the **Hellenic** Premier, then second and fourth in the following seasons.

However in 2017/18 the Kingfishers embarked on an incredible 40 game unbeaten run (in all competitions), winning all but one game between the end of October and end of April. This saw Thatcham overtake long-time leaders Highworth Town and eventually pip Bracknell Town to the title in a thrilling end to the season, on goal difference.

After taking a season to re-adjust to step four football, in 2019/20 Thatcham were top of the **Southern League** Division One South table with eleven games to play. But with the club looking set to achieve its highest ever finish, and promotion to step three a real possibility, the Coronavirus pandemic struck with the season being terminated. Following the subsequent departure of the management team and many senior players, alongside being moved into the **Isthmian League** South Central Division the club faced a rebuilding job. Covid also caused the 2020/21 season to be suspended before Town finished 12th in 2021/22, then recovered from a poor start in 2022/23 to finish 13th.



Thatcham Town FC have enjoyed some memorable success in Cup competitions over the years. In 1989 the club reached the last eight of the **FA Vase** before losing to local rivals Hungerford Town.

In the same competition a record attendance of 1,400 was set when Aldershot Town won 1-0 at Waterside Park in 1993/94. However in 2017/18 Thatcham went all the way and lifted the trophy at Wembley Stadium on a brilliant day for the football club...

Supporters started to sense the club could be on the verge of something special after a 5th round home victory over Bromsgrove Sporting, then over 2,200 attended the quarter-final win at Melksham Town as cup fever started to spread across the town. Thatcham then defeated 1874 Northwich 1-0 (home) and 3-2 (away) in the two legged semi-final, before taking over 5,000 fans to Wembley as Northern League side Stockton Town were beaten 1-0 in the final.



The club played in the Third Round Qualifying stage of the **FA Trophy** for the first time in 2021/22, losing on penalties at Cinderford Town. Thatcham's best run in the **FA Cup** came in the 1996/97 season as they reached the Fourth Round Qualifying stage before losing at Boreham Wood. In September 2019 the FA Cup First Round Qualifying tie at home to Salisbury was streamed live by the BBC with the visitors winning 3-2.

Thatcham completed the Hellenic League and Cup double, by lifting the **Hellenic First Division Cup** in 1972/73 and the **Premier Division Cup** in 1974/75. During 2017/18 the club reached both League Cup finals, losing to Bracknell in the **Challenge Cup** and Binfield in the **Floodlit Cup**.

During the 1990s Thatcham won the **Wessex League Cup** on four occasions, completing the league and Cup double in 1995/96. In 1974/75 the club were beaten in the final of the **Berks & Bucks Senior Cup** but were awarded the trophy following a dispute between the victors, Wycombe Wanderers, and the Berks & Bucks FA.
